JOHN JACOBSEN

Passes the Baton After 36 Years of Service

CARPENTER, PROJECT MANAGER, PARTY PLANNER, LANDSCAPE DESIGNER, ACCOUNTANT, COMPUTER GURU—A JACK OF ALL TRADES—John Jacobsen has done it all. After 36 years of service to the Obsidians, John is stepping back and passing the baton(s) to other Obsidian members.

John got his start with the Obsidians in 1983 as a mountain climber. Within two years, in 1985, he was on the Obsidian Board, beginning service to the club that continues to this day.

John served as Board President in 1988, 2001, 2005 and 2011, the longest tenure of any Board President. After noticing that there was no budgeting, John established and served on the Budget Committee. Club Historian Lenore McManigal remarked: “If it were not for John, the Club would not be in the great financial status that it is in today.”

There is hardly a committee that John has not served on or chaired. John chaired the Climbs Committee in 1986. He created the Obsidian website with Wayne Deeter in 2002. He has served on the Online Committee ever since, putting in countless hours each week and over the years updating, maintaining, and improving the website. When a member could not access a function on the website from her home computer, and the problem could not be resolved over the phone, John went to the member’s home to fix the problem. Now that’s customer service!

In 2006, with Joella Ewing, John started the monthly ExploraTalks while serving on the Science/Education Committee. He served on the Publications Committee that put the *Bulletin* online.

While chairing the Membership Committee in 2003, John created the online membership database. This allowed members to sign up for trips on the website. No more trekking to the YMCA to sign up for an activity.

John chaired or co-chaired six summer camps. Each camp was a monumental task, usually scouting the location a year in advance. Camp Funkhouser in the North Cascades in 2017 required Forest Service permits for the camp site, to pump water from a stream, and to dispose of water from solar showers. John even arranged for a contractor to grade the road to the campground. And then there was the unusual. At Camp Pegg at West Yellowstone in 2007, John saved six children who were about to be carried off by high winds like Dorothy in the Wizard of Oz (see account by Buzz Blumm on next page).



In 2004 John chaired a special construction committee that renovated and added to the Lodge. He sought out member funding for the project that tore down the old entrance, repaired dry rot, and created the new entry location and foyer.

John chaired the Lodge Grounds Committee in 1990 and then from 1992 through 2021, a total of 30 years. Projects included new planting beds, new fences and a gate, new handrails for the outside stairs, cleanup from two major ice and snowstorms, a multi-zone sprinkler system, and removal of dead and dying fir trees from the 2015 drought. John spent hours, usually by himself, blowing out the leaves and other debris from driveways and parking spaces prior to potlucks and other Lodge functions. He brought his DR mower from home to carve out a defensible fire break around the Lodge. We have our beautiful grounds thanks to John’s leadership and work.

In his many years with the club, John participated in 306 trips (hikes, climbs, bus trips, etc.). He led 91 of those trips, including leading 11 mountain climbs.

It is no wonder that, given all John has done for the club, the Board in 2013 bestowed John with the title of *Honorary Obsidian*, with the notation, *the legendary Mr. Obsidian*.

The Obsidians thank John Jacobsen for all that he has done and accomplished for the club in the past 36 years. It has been a remarkable career of service.

Buzz Blumm Remembers

JOHAN JACOBSEN CERTAINLY HAS PROVIDED YEARS OF SERVICE IN MANY FORMS, but there is one incident our family will not forget.

At the 2007 Yellowstone / Earthquake Lake Summer Camp most of the adults, including my wife Cecile and me, were off hiking. Chair John was in the camp taking care of the usual daily chores. One adult and six young children—my two kids, Jane Hackett's two grandchildren, Christine McManigal, and Sam Scherer—were sitting around the dining tables doing crafts when the skies darkened, and the wind picked up. John saw a funnel over the lake and told the kids to hustle into a nearby pickup/camper but they ignored him and continued on with their crafts. Then it became urgent, and paraphrasing my daughter Maddie, he hollered to get in the [bleeping] truck. This time they hustled into the pickup with no time to spare. Seconds later the tables and benches sailed fifteen feet up in the air.

Lives were saved that day—I've mentioned this incident to John with gratitude several times since.

AmeriCorps Update

LODGE CHAIR DAVE COOPER GREETED THE AMERICORPS TEAM when they moved into the Obsidian Lodge late in the evening of January 19. Their arrival was a week later than expected due to coronavirus testing. The nine members of the team settled in, sleeping on cots spread throughout the main floor.

AmeriCorps National Civilian Community Corps is the domestic equivalent of the Peace Corps. Teams travel throughout the United States, spending about one month at a time working on projects for various public and nonprofit sponsors. Team members range in age from 18 to 26, with a mix of high school and college graduates. AmeriCorps teams can be immediately pressed into service in the event of a national emergency. Several years ago, an AmeriCorps team cared for pets after the Camp Fire destroyed Paradise, California.

Our team will be together for a total of ten months. Most hail from the East Coast or Midwest, with the closest participant from Colorado. They started service in October, working four weeks at a food bank in Indio, California. The team's next assignment was in Sacramento, where they worked for *Rebuilding Together*, making minor repairs and doing yard cleanup at private homes. They also delivered food boxes to people in need.

The team's next stop was Eugene, where they are sponsored by Eugene Parks and Open Space. Most of their work will be in the city's parks, with various projects such as planting trees and removing invasive plants like English ivy. A three-day project in Alton Baker Park involved removing rock pavers in the two picnic pavilions, excavating the earth, laying rebar and building wooden forms, all in preparation for a pour of concrete.

Team members expressed various reasons for joining AmeriCorps. Common themes were exploring careers, learning new skills, challenging oneself, seeing the country, and serving the public. They are volunteers, but do receive a stipend towards their education. They will have the opportunity to job shadow city employees during their stay. A member from a previous team job shadowed the Eugene city attorney.

After a hard day's work, they shower, swim and exercise at the YMCA. Team members share cooking duties in the Lodge kitchen, preparing a common meal. They discovered the Ribbon Trail to Hendricks Park and hiked up Spencer Butte. Visits to Portland and the Oregon coast are planned. Potential excursions are a visit to the Cascades Raptor Center, a campus tour, a hike at Silver Creek Falls State Park, and cross-country skiing to Gold Lake. As the team is on a limited food budget, they enjoy desserts provided by city workers and Obsidians, including an apple crisp baked by Janet Jacobsen.

Obsidian Jim Northrop worked with the AmeriCorps team in Hendricks Park and enjoyed their enthusiasm and optimism: *It was inspiring and energizing to work with our future leaders who have their entire lives before them.*

The team departs February 20. After Eugene, their next assignment is at a food bank in Tacoma, Washington.

Freeze the Day!

A History of Winter Sports in Oregon

Skiing

Cascade Powder

Although skiing has been practiced as a mode of travel for thousands of years, and even used by military troops in northern regions, it did not become common as a sport until the nineteenth century. The first style practiced was Nordic, or cross-country, which is useful for traveling across flatlands and rolling hills. Downhill skiing, also known as Alpine, became the rage in Europe during the 1880s and has since grown to be the most popular form of the sport. Organized skiing events began in the late nineteenth century, and were included in the first modern Winter Olympics in 1924, which brought skiing to the attention of the world. By the late 1920s, the sport had taken off in Oregon. On February 22, 1927, Oregon's first ski race took contestants forty-two miles, from Fort Klamath to Crater Lake. The race became an annual event, with other competitions added. Soon after, enthusiasts formed three winter recreation organizations: the Obsidians in Eugene, Cascade Ski Club in Government Camp, and the Skyliners in Bend.

LANA LINDSTROM RECENTLY VISITED THE EXHIBIT and was surprised to learn that the Obsidians were active in winter sports in 1927. She sent the photo [at left] to the *Bulletin* with this question: *I thought that the club was formed due to a climbing accident! Who knew!*

Here is our answer:

September 21, 1927: A search and rescue effort prompted some Eugene folks to meet at the Chamber of Commerce to form an outdoor club.

November 3, 1927: Eugene Outdoor Club was organized with 43 charter members. The Obsidian name originated at the first summer outing in 1928 after climbing the Three Sisters in four days. “Hard as obsidian” became a popular metaphor among members of the club and it was decided to advocate the change in the name of the organization.

January 1, 1928: Ray Sims wrote in his *History of the Obsidian Club*: *A few Sunday ski trips were made in the upper McKenzie country, but as the newly formed organization had no club house, this sport did not attract many until the first New Years Party, held January 1 and 2, 1928. The outing was held at the McKenzie Hotel, McKenzie Bridge, with 34 people attending, 19 of whom chartered a bus from Eugene. Dean Bovard led one group on a hike to Frizzell Point, while a second group under the leadership of Ray Sims took the bus to Lost Creek Ranch, where skiing, tobogganing and snowshoe sports took place. One event long to be remembered was turning the large bus around at Lost Creek Ranch, which took over an hour in the two and a half feet of snow. Several Mazamas of Portland [also] attended the...Club's first Winter Outing...*

1928–1939: The Club acquired a winter headquarters at the old Lewis Cabin where they could gather for annual winter outings, winter sports and even ski races.

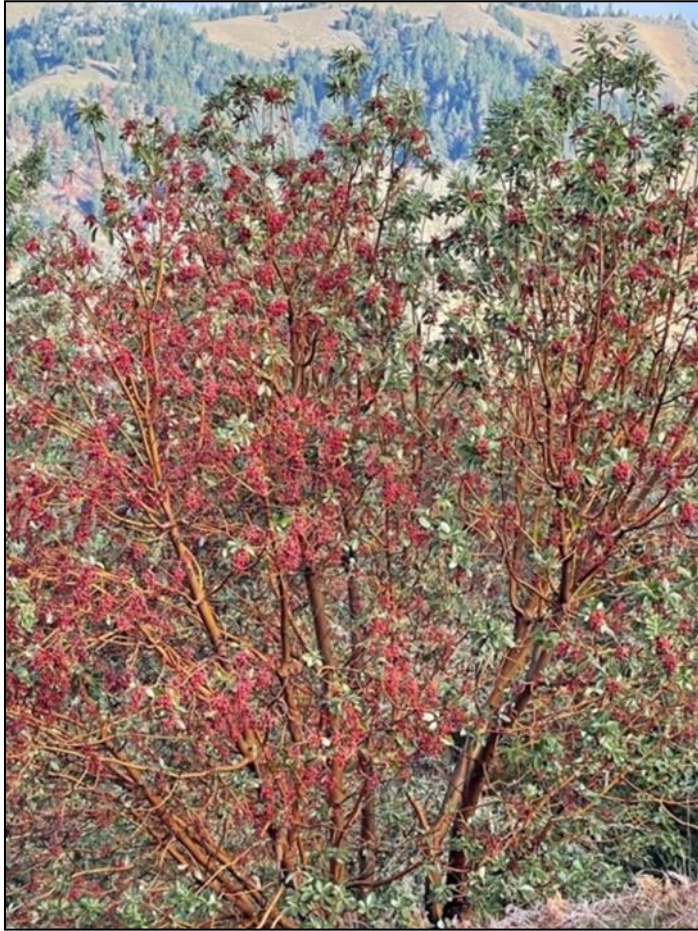

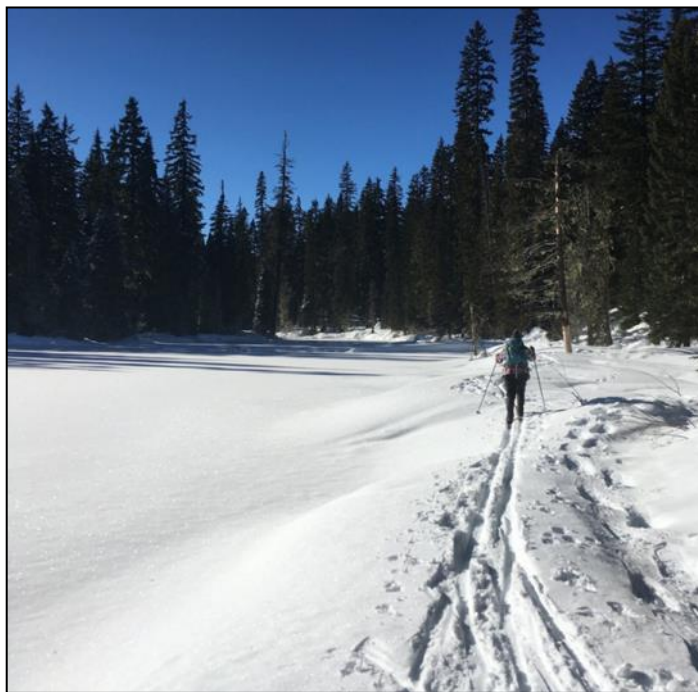

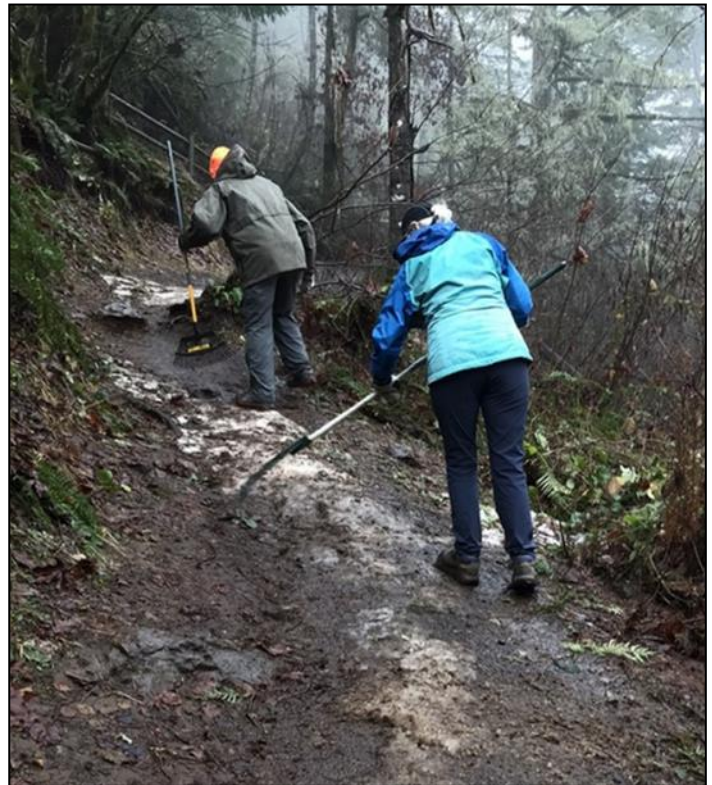

Maryanne welcomed Angie Ruzicka as a new Board Member, Laura Osinga as the new Vice President, and the new and returning Committee Chairs. Thanks were offered to Stewart Hoeg, Dave Cooper, and Matt Bell for past and continued service to the club.

The Board approved the minutes for December, 2021.

Treasurer's Report (Stewart Hoeg): Stewart reviewed the year-to-date income and expenses as well as the balance sheet. The Board approved the bills.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Bus Trips (Jim Northrop—interim): The Bus Committee will wait until the most recent surge in COVID-19 omicron cases has settled down before deciding if bus trips will be offered in 2022. There will not be a Bus Rally this year. If bus trips are offered, they most likely will be one-day trips, although there is a chance we will offer the four-day Columbia River Sternwheeler trip in May. We may require that all bus riders be fully vaccinated, so we encourage bus riders to receive their vaccinations and boosters.

Concessions (Carla Cooper): After discussion with Lyndell about the Safety Committee's plan to encourage everyone to carry their own first aid kit, Concessions has purchased a small stock of Sam Splints and sit-upons. (The sit-upons can be used as a splint in case of an emergency.) Since these items are too spendy for the Safety Committee to supply for free, Concessions will make them available at our usual discount prices.

Conservation/SciEd (Kay Coots and Angie Ruzicka): ExploraTalks We hope to get back to the Lodge for a presentation by late spring. In the meantime, we are working on one or two possible Zoom ExploraTalks. **Book Group** We plan to have at least one more book group with a yet to be determined book. **Other Activities** We discussed possible educational conservation and/or science walks/talks.

Lodge Grounds (Jim Northrop—interim): The Lodge and grounds were inspected on January 3. The recent snowstorm and windstorm did not damage any trees.

Membership (Diane Schechter): The task group will meet to address increasing membership, retaining members, increasing online options, and reduced dues for low-income individuals.

Safety (Lyndell Wilken): The Safety Committee will move forward with buying first aid supplies for our leaders. The Board has approved the purchase and steps are being taken to order supplies through Boundtree Medical Supply and Amazon. Supplies will be distributed at a spring leaders meeting. Any leftover first aid supplies will be offered to other club members that do not lead but participate in many activities.

Stewardship (Jorry Rolfe & Darko Sojak): We have two new ongoing project agreements: **City of Eugene, Parks and Open Space.** In addition to the ongoing collaboration regarding maintenance work in Spencer Butte Park and the Ridgeline the

Obsidians will be working with Kelsey Irvine, Native Plant and Waterways Volunteer Coordinator, and Ecologist Lauri Holts on a North Bank restoration project. Two activities occurred in the fall that involved plantings, ivy removal, and litter pickup. This will prove to become a rewarding agreement and project with city staff because the location is a sensitive riparian area along the North Bank Path (between Valley River Center and Ferry Street Bridge), property the City acquired from ODOT in February—there had been garbage, pollution, behavior and camping issues at this site. The City supplies all tools and plants for each activity. It feels really good to be part of the local effort to protect our waterways! **McKenzie River Trust** Through the dedication of Darko and Dave C., along with MRT's Volunteer Programs Manager Elizabeth Goward, the Obsidians have adopted a 2.5-acre plot at Green Island. This comes after a very successful November activity on this property. We supply our tools for each activity, with about four planned throughout the year. The Committee welcomes all volunteers for our 2022 Obsidian stewardship projects. There are no fees to join activities.

OLD BUSINESS

Strategic Plan Updates: Tax Status Change Maryanne reports that working in concert with Dave Atkin, the Club is on target with the changes.

Online Task Group Marci reported RFPs were sent to 6 companies, 4 declined the proposal and 2 returned with bids. 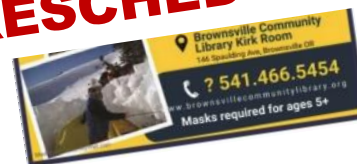
A MONTH AGO SNOW WAS PILING UP IN THE CASCADES and dusting or blanketing everything below, and Oregon looked a lot like winter. We hope early February will bring lower temperatures and snow in the mountains to offer opportunities to ski, sled, and snowshoe. What better time than the new year to lead an Obsidians trip? In 2021, Obsidians were adeptly led by ten new leaders (thanks to these leaders for making several dozen trippers very happy). Another forty-one returning leaders welcomed a growing number of outdoor enthusiasts to high points near and far. With about 400 current Obsidian members, the board has set a target to increase leader numbers by 10% every year. You could be one of those new leaders in 2022!

A snowshoe or cross country ski trip on the shoreline trail at the north end of Waldo Lake is a rewarding wintry option. The other easterly direction on the McKenzie Highway offers Potato Hill Sno-Park about thirty minutes shy of Santiam Pass. The trail is a wide, safe climb to an intersection with spectacular views in either direction. The loop on this rewarding ski or snowshoe is an excellent choice for a first-time leader.

Not crazy about snow? You might enjoy leading a coastal hike. Cape Perpetua Scenic Area, including the Gwynn Creek Loop (about 6.5 miles), or the Hobbitt Trail-Washburne Memorial State Park Loop are beautiful, not too distant options.
