ALL PLANS FOR OBSIDIAN LODGE REJECTED BY MEMBERSHIP

SPECIAL MEETING HELD

FORTY SIX OBSIDIANS ATTENDED THE DINNER AND SPECIAL MEETING JUNE SEVENTH, AT THE RIVER ROAD WOMEN'S OBSIDIAN SONGS WERE CLUB HOUSE. LED BY LOUIS WALDORF DURING THE DINNER.

PAUL LAFFERTY GAVE A REPORT OF HIS RECENT UNUSUAL ASCENT OF THE MIDDLE SISTER ON SKIS.

MINUTES OF THE LAST ANNUAL MEETING WERE READ AND APPROVED. AFTER EACH OF THE PRESENT BOARD MEM-BERS WERE INTRODUCED A FEW GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS WERE MADE BY THE LEAD-ERS OF THE NEXT MONTHS TRIPS.

ROBERY LEMON, PRESIDENT OF THE OBSIDIAN CLUB BOARD ANNOUNCED THAT SINCE LAST FALL THE BOARD HAD BEEN FORMULATING PLANS FOR THE CONSTRUC-TION OF THE MUCH DESIRED OBSIDIAN LODGE, AND THAT THE PURPOSE OF THIS SPECIAL MEETING, WHICH HAD BEEN CALLED BY THE BOARD FOR ALL MEM-BERS, WAS TO VOTE THEIR APPROVAL OF THE SITE, THE GENERAL PLANS, AND THE AUTHORIZATION OF BONDS TO BE ISSUED OVER A GIVEN LENGTH OF TIME. THE LEASE TO THE PROPERTY FROM THE FOREST SERVICE FOR FIVE ACRES WAS READY TO BE SIGNED AND ANYONE MIS-TAKING THE LODGE FOR A CABIN SHOULD BE FINED FIVE CENTS. MONITORS WERE THEN APPOINTED AT EACH TABLE AND THE FUN STARTED. AS FOR THE FIVE CENTS COLLECTED TO GO TOWARD THE BUILDING OF THIS LODGE, SEVERAL SPEAKERS HAD A LAPSE OF MEMORY OR SLIP OF THE TONGUE WHICH BROUGHT THE TOTAL FUND UP TO SEVENTY CENTS FOR THE EVENING.

THE DISCUSSION FROM THE FLOOR BEGAN WITH THE SUBJECT OF THE PRO-POSED LOCATION AND WE MAY SAY THUS ENDED SOMETIME LATER.

PAUL LAFFERTY WAS WHOLEHEART-EDLY ENTHUSIASTIC OVER A LOCATION ON OR CLOSE TO SIMS BUTTE, FOR THE REASON THAT IT WOULD BE UP FAR ENOUGH FOR SKIING WHERE THE BEST SNOW CONDITIONS ARE, AND IN THE FUTURE WOULD RIVAL ANYTHING TO BE FOUND NEAR RAINIER OR MT. HOOD. HE ALSO POINTED OUT THAT THIS WOULD BE CLOSER TO THE THREE SIS-TERS AREA FOR SUMMER CLIMBS. HE ALSO POINTED OUT THAT TWO OF THE (CONTINUED ON PAGE 2)

WAS IT FEASIBLE TO TRY TO CLIMB THE MIDDLE SISTER ON SKIS? ONLY ONE WAY TO FIND OUT, SO MY BROTHER I BUCKLED ON OUR SKIS AND

WITH CLKMBERS ON THE SKIS, WE EXPERIENCED NO DIFFICULTY IN GET-TING UP. IN FACT WE FELT THAT WE WERE MAKING BETTER PROGRESS THAN WE WOULD HAVE MADE ON THE BARE GROUND UNDER SUMMER CONDITIONS. NEAR THE SUMMIT, WHERE THE SNOW HAS PRETTY WELL BLOWN OFF THE BARE ROCKS, WE LEFT THE SLIP STICKS AND FINISHED ON FOOT. WE HAD QUITE A TIME FINDING THE BOX IN THE SNOW, THOUGH, AT THE TOP. IT WAS SWELL UP THERE--GRAND VIEW.

COMING DOWN WE MADE IT IN FIF-TEEN MINUTESJ YEP, THAT'S RIGHT. AT FIRST WE THOUGHT WE MIGHT SHOOT OFF SOME CLIFF EDGE COMING DOWN, THE SNOW WAS SO FAST GOING UP. BUT BY GOING-DOWN TIME IT WAS MID-DAY, AND THE SUN HAD SOFTENED UP THE SNOW JUST ENOUGH AND NOT TOO MUCH.

IT WAS A WONDERFUL EXPERIENCE. HOPE ALL OF US CAN HAVE THE SAME THRILL IN THE FUTURE. PERHAPS WIN-TER CLIMBING IS NOT IMPOSSIBLE, AFTER ALL.



LODGE STORY CONTINUED THREE SISTERS WERE VISIBLE FROM THIS POINT. IT IS APPROXIMATELY ONE HALF MILE FROM FROG CAMP BY TRAIL NOW.

A MOTION WAS MADE BY PAUL LAFFERTY THAT SINCE THE OBSTACLE FOR SUCH A LOCATION WAS THE CLOS-ING OF THE MCKENZIE HIGHWAY, THAT THEREFORE A SPECIAL COMMITTEE BE APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT TO MAKE FURTHER APPEAL TO THE STATE HIGH-WAY COMMISSION, IN ORDER TO HAVE SOME DEFINITE ASSURANCE AS TO WHAT COULD BE EXPECTED.

NUMEROUS OPINIONS WERE THEN EXPRESSED BY VARIOUS MEMBERS CON-CERNING JUST HOW FAR THEY THOUGHT WE COULD REASONABLY EXPECT THE COMMISSION TO GO ON SUCH A PROPOSI-TION. THE SANTIAM PASS AND THE WILLAMETTE HIGHWAY PASS WERE BROUGHT INTO THE DISCUSSION FOR YEAR AROUND USE AND THE POSSIBLE LODGE LOCATIONS IN THESE AREAS.

DORR HAMLIN, WHO HAD BEEN OUR OBSIDIAN CLUB REPRESENTATIVE TO MEET THE STATE HIGHWAY COMM-ISSION IN PORTLAND THIS WINTER, GAVE THE REPORT THAT THE MEMBERS WERE FAVORABLE TO DOING WHAT THEY COULD TOWARD KEEPING THE ROAD OPEN TO FROG CAMP FOR RECREATIONAL AREAS ONLY, BUT AS TO AN ALL YEAR 'ROUND THROUGH ROAD IT WAS OUT OF THE QUES-TION. THEY HAD ALSO ASSURED MR. HAMLIN AND THE COMMITTEE THAT WHEN THE SANTIAM PASS WAS CLEARED THIS SPRING THEY WOULD SEND SOME RE-PRESENTATIVE OVER TO SEE WHAT COULD BE DONE TO THE MCKENZIE. THEY GOULD NOT ASSURE OUR REPRESENTA-TIVES THAT THE ROAD WOULD EVEN BE OILED ON THE EUGENE SIDE OF THE PASS THIS YEAR. ANYONE WHO DROVE OVER THE PASS LAST SUMMER COULD NOT HELP BUT BE APPALLED THAT OUR STATES' MOST ADVERTISED SCENIC HIGHWAY WAS IN SUCH A DEPLORABLE CONDITION. WASHBOARD ROAD BED, AND BLINDING CLOUDS OF DUST TENDS TO ROUTE THE OUT OF STATE VISITORS AND OUR OWN PEOPLE OVER OTHER ROADS .

IT SEEMS APPARENT THAT IT WILL BE AT LEAST THREE OR FOUR YEARS YET BEFORE THE WILLAMETTE AND SANTIAM PASSES WILL BE ALL YEAR ROUND ROADS AND PERHAPS THEN SOME-THING COULD BE DONE ABOUT THE MC-KENZIE.

ALL OF THESE REASONS PERTAIN-ING TO THE CONDITIONS OF THE MC-KENZIE AND THE ATTITUDE OF THE STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION WERE INSTRU-MENTAL IN DEFEATING PAUL LAFFERTY'S MOTION TO ATTEMPT TO SECURE A DE-FINATE STATEMENT FROM THE COMMISS-ION AS TO WHAT WE COULD EXPECT IN EVENT OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF A LODGE AT THE HIGH AREAS.

IN MARKED CONTRAST TO PAUL'S PROPOSAL FOR A LODGE SITE IN HIGH Country came the suggestion from Henry Korn, that it would be best to locate the Lodge within a short Distance from Eugene up the McKenzie close to the river where members Goind go with their families and have frequent picnics and week end parties, making general social Affairs more popular. Helen Kilpat-Mick, Paul Wiser and Dorr Hamlin Were of the same opinion.

ED. JOHNSON FELT FROM THE UN-GERTAINTY OF DEVELOPMENT OF TRANS-MOUNTAIN ROADS, PLUS THE QUESTION OF WHAT REALLY IS DESIRED IN A LODGE, THAT IT WOULD BE BEST TO DELAY FOR A TIME. Louis Waldorf made the suggestion that we might do as the Wyeast Club did and put several inexpensive so called Mountain Huts in different mountain areas, rather than spend all our money on one extensive lodge.

MARIAN HAYES FELT IT ECONOMICALLY UNSOUND TO INVEST IN A LOCATION WHICH WE MIGHT NOT BE ABLE TO USE IN WINTER AND UNFAIR TO EXPECT THE HIGHWAY COMM-ISSION TO KEEP THE ROAD OPEN JUST FOR THIS VICINITY.

THE LOCATION SHOWN IN THE ILLUS-TRATION HAD BEEN CHOSEN BY THE BOARD AS AN IDEAL COMPROMISE BETWEEN THOSE AMONG THE PEAKS" SITE, AND THOSE WISHING A LOWER, EASILY REACHED, RIV-ER FRONTAGE "WEEK-END FOR FAMILIES" LOCATION. THE PROPOSED SITE, SEVENTY "WEEK-END FOR FAMILIES MILES FROM EUGENE, IS 2.55 MILES FROM THE TOP OF DEADHORSE GRADE AND 3.4 MILES FROM FROG CAMP. THIS, THE BOARD FELT, WAS SUFFICIENTLY TO SAT-ISFY THE "HIGH COUNTRY" ADDICTS, FOR THOSE WHO WANTED A LOCATION FOR THE FAMILY TYPE OF OUTING OR FOR A LAZY SUNDAY, THE SITE WAS ADVOCATED AS BEING ONLY SEVENTY MILE DRIVE FROM EUGENE, ON AN EXPOSED SOUTHERN SLOPE ALLOWING PLENTY OF SUN, AND WITH A VIEW EQUAL TO ANY ON THE MC-KENZIE HIGHWAY. HERE, JUST OFF THE EXTENSIVE SUMMIT AREA, HENSE SHELT-ERED FROM THE WORST STORMS, LOOKING DOWN THE VALLEY WITH THE CLIFFS OF DEER BUTTE SILHOUETTED AGAINST GOLD-EN SUNSETS, AND LOOKING EAST AND South to the Three Sisters glisten-ING IN THE CHANGING LIGHT, THE BOARD FELT THEY HAD THE IDEAL SPOT. BUT THE BOARD WAS WRONG. -30-
