Are Summer Camps Doomed?

The records of other mountain-
eering clubs as well as our own
show a marked decline in Sum-
mer outing registrations. The
number attending Summer camp
last year was very small—neces-
sitating a reduction in the sched-
ule to break even on the expense.
The Mazamas have become quite
concerned over this same situa-
tion. In 1939 they are trying out
the idea of two separate one-week
outings.

But is this the solution, and the
cost the principal reason for re-
duced registration? We think not.

The cost of an outing must al-
ways be kept as low as possible
for what is offered and we can
not always take trips to distant
points. However, we believe that
the number who will attend any
outing is in direct proportion to
the attraction of the region or the
interest which is created in it by
the Outing Committee. A study
of our outing records will bear
this out.

There are a number of Maza-
mas who have been members for
years that attend almost every
outing. To them their two weeks
in the mountains is as much a
regular part of their lives as any-
thing they do. A number of Ob-
sidiens feel the same way. Some
of us are so tied down in the Sum-
mer that we can not get away

every year but would do so if it
were possible.

But the younger members seem
to take a little different attitude
toward the mountains and out-
ings. They are inclined to rush
in, climb a mountain or two and
hurry out. They have not learned
the real enjoyment which comes
from a Summer camp—that of a
complete change from their every
day life of work, study, hurry and
conflict. A real Summer outing
replaces these with fun, exercise,
rest, disregard for time, whole-
some companionship— real RE-
creation.

We believe that THIS is why
our outings to the more remote
places — where members cannot
continually come and go—have
been the most enjoyable—they
have brought out this real outing
spirit.

So we believe that this idea
must be sold to all our members
—especially the younger ones.
Let us decide on a good outing
location and then talk it up and
put this idea across; and we will
have a successful one every year.

assistance in case of accidents,
and are distinguished by means
of an orange and black armband.

The first open Junior Ski meet was sponsored by the Obsidian Club at the Sand Hills, atop the McKenzie Pass, Sunday, Dec. 4. The Pass had been falsely reported closed and in spite of the adverse publicity a grand turnout of more than a hundred skiers were on hand to help in turning the cars around in the center of the lava beds with a foot of slush snow on the highway.

All then set out for the Sand Hills where a stiff wind and a few swirling clouds greeted the skiers.

At one o'clock the juniors were lined up by Tony Vogel, Tom Wiper, Bryan Ryan and Ray Sims and the slalom and down hill races were run.

Ralph Lafferty won first in the slalom in 30 seconds, Ed O'Reilly second in 31 seconds and Wallace Clark and Bud Hurlbert third in 35 seconds.

The junior down hill race was won by Joe Jackson in 9 seconds, Wallace Clark was second in 10 seconds and five tied for third in 11 seconds, Ralph Lafferty, Bud Hulbert, Jimmy Donahue, Coulter Mitchell and Ed O'Reilly.

The girls slalom race was run over the same course and was won by Ruth Carlson in 64 seconds, three were tied for second, Blanche Osborn, Eileen Baker and Harriett Plotts with 65 seconds and Elizabeth Edmunds third in 72 seconds.
