TALE OF SKIING WINS **IN LIARS' CONTEST**

I, with a ski party, found myself in the vicinity of the Three Sisters in a blizzard. The wind seemed to be blowing right around and around the mountains, so we turned our skis upvard to keep from going too fast, and went up with the wind, arriving on top of the Middle Sister. While the rest of the party was signing the book, I dropped off to sleep. When I awakened, the others had gone, and the fog was so thick I could not see which way to go.

I was bewildered, and asked the Sisters to help me, as I had to be at the Cabins by 3 o'clock for a New Year's dinner. The Middle Sister asked the South Sister to blow a cold blast from the open lake in the glacier on top, that it might freeze the fog so that I r. could pass over the top. She did so, and the fog was frozen as hard and smooth as glass.
