Obsidian Program For War-Time

There are rumors to the effect that the Obsidians will cancel some of their planned trips, but such action is contrary to the wish of local and federal authorities. It seems that in the very near future the Obsidians, Inc. will play a very important part in the welfare of the general public.

It is the desire and wish of federal and local authorities that the Obsidians, Inc. should carry on their program as scheduled, and that they should further intensify their program in regard to exploration of trails in mountains and training of leaders. The Obsidian Board will have a meeting Tuesday evening, December 16, at which time plans concerning the following will be made:

1. First aid in accordance with instructions released from the National Defense Council.
2. Training of individual members in order to comply with the qualifications of the National Ski Patrol.
3. Organization of additional ski patrols to work in cooperation with local organizations.
4. Elaboration of our present local walks program with the following objects in mind:
 - a. Familiarizing individuals with the terrain and trails of the surrounding mountains.
 - b. Providing suitable recreation for individuals in time of need.
 - c. Training members to become better leaders.
 - d. Developing individual members to have a better under-

Last winter on two occasions a number of Obsidians made a trip to the Willamette Summit to study the possibilities for skiing. On the whole these parties didn't recommend the area for skiing, mainly because of the timber everywhere present. Nevertheless, the Willamette Summit is right in our front yard, can be reached in one and a half hours, over a beautiful wide straight road which is kept clear of snow all winter and is thus the nearest and easiest ski area to reach.

The elevation is 5,000 feet up to 6,500, depending on how far

standing of nature in relation of our future.

e. Organization and teaching organization within our own group.

5. Training of junior Obsidians so that they will be able to carry on a better program in the future.

6. Formation of an organization, which will in all likelihood be the Board, to have direct contact with local and federal authorities.

7. Elaboration of our present Search Committee into an organization that will better handle war-time needs.

I think every Obsidian will agree that our program is of such a nature that it can be carried on better during a period of war than during peace time because during war we will have more to actually offer members than we would have at any other time. However, our program should be broad enough so that our knowledge of the mountains and the trails may become available for the general welfare of the public.

Some of our members are already in the army and the navy and more of us will most likely be called. They are doing more than their part in upholding the good name of the Obsidians, Inc. We should do our part by cooperating with local and federal officials in any plans that they might have for us.

WINTER OUTING

The Winter Outing Committee has received a letter from the Mazamas, stating that Obsidians are welcome to use Mazama Lodge for their Winter Outing, March 22nd to 29th. Among other facilities will be the use of Mazama Hill and Timberline for ski activities.

one goes up McFarland Butte with the ski area. The Sand Hills are about 5,200, Hand Lake and Hoo Doo about 4,800. The depth of snow last winter was approximately that of Hoo Doo.

The timber is just itching to be cleared. A chocker is placed around a tree twelve inches in diameter and the little cat says "Come on Mr. Tree" and the tree comes cracking and popping down and out at the roots. It is bucked up and piled neatly on a heap for wood in the coming winter. The timber is smaller as the altitude increases, so clearing becomes more and more a real pleasure. You will be surprised when you see how rapidly the clearing has been progressing.

Those interested in the area are especially anxious to have many beginners in skiing. There are plenty of small slightly inclined slopes for learning to stem, stop, turn, and whatever pleases the fancy.

An area has been set aside for teaching where those taking les-

sons will not be disturbed by curious onlookers. Then, too, those who want a real thrill and are sure they can manage the slats may go by tow to the top of the trail and come down, turn right, turn left, stem and turn till they sail out upon the broad open spaces below. There will be a shelter called the Willamette Shelter, with a stove for warming your baked beans. The Highway Commission has indicated they would attend to the parking area.

An organization, called the Upper Willamette Winters Sports Association, has been formed to contact the Forest Service, attend to the business and development of the area, and encourage the participation of the public in winter sports. The membership will consist of those using the area. Directors will be chosen from each of the more or less adjacent communities, and they will conduct the business of the Association. The officers this coming year are: Dr. O. R. Gullion, President; Roy Temple, Vice-President; Ed Clark, Secretary-Treasurer.
