Then, too, those who want a real thrill and are sure they can manage the slats may go by tow to the top of the trail and come down, turn right, turn left, stem and turn till they sail out upon the broad open spaces below. There will be a shelter called the Willamette Shelter, with a stove for warming your baked beans. The Highway Commission has indicated they would attend to the parking area.
