ment you had to buy to rub on your bruises.

Because of so many stops, while Glen sprinted back along the highway to retrieve hats blown overboard, we were late in arriving at our destination, however, there were so many skilled and experienced workers, repairs moved swiftly.

Bob Lemon and Glen Sims coaxed the mud and fir needles out of the water system and the cold sparkling water ran as before. Louie as usual, had to look into things, especially the top of a hydrant that was being persuaded to disgorge its plug of muck, well it did, and Louie looked like he had been hit with a mud pie square in the eye.

The road and trail crew under the able leadership of Darwin, cleared the trails and roads, filling holes, removing logs, rocks and fallen trees until they looked just as good as if the CCC had done it.

Dorr with his saw and hammer, a pocket full of nails, followed by Lloyd, did a grand job of repairing crippled tables, benches and shelters.

It was the women folks that made the showing tho, raking up the debris about the shelters, tables and parking places, polishing the stoves and faucets.

Then we ate and ate and didn't feel much like working any more.

A vote was taken on whether to return the way we came or go by the way of Fish Lake. Of course everyone wanted to go by

the lake, so we all piled in the truck and went up the river over the big slide, which is immense, past jump off Joe, turned to the right into the McKenzie cutoff road. There we came close to nature and passed through the most beautiful stand of Douglas Fir in the world. In fact you come so close to nature that one had to keep his neck and elbows well inside the truck or be decapitated and disarmed.

We took on gas at the Fish Lake Guard station, by the way, there is real water in the lake this year in place of mules eating grass.

Then on to Clear Lake Forest Camp, there we ate what remained of the chicken and cake, took a look at the Big Spring and a deer feeding among the shrubs on the further shore.

As the little boy said as his Mother led him out back, "now the pain begins" that cut off road is sure cut off and up and around. The 2x4 seats crosswise of the truck supposed to hold up 1,000 pounds, was occupied by three lean mountain climbers, enjoying the bumps, when there was a splintering crash, a shriek or two, and the three bruised and flattened Obsidians sat in the three big dents on the floor, how the Forest Service will remove those dents is their problem, as we signed away all liability.

Nevertheless we arrived home, tired, hungry and sleepy and ready to rest a week.

MYRTIE'S DIARY

July 23rd '43.

Ruth Hopson, Helen Kilpatrick and Myrtie Hamlin left Eugene at 3:40 arrived at Scott Lake 7:20, decided to camp here the whole week instead of part time at West Lava as first planned. We are glad we got "headnets" as the mosquitoes are thick and hungry. We stopped near Yales while Helen banded two baby night-hawks that Ruth had found the week before. They were hard to find as there was no nest and they were the color of the twigs and dry grass. We nearly stepped on them before the mother flew up. She lit on a nearby log and hissed at us with her wings spread out flat on the logs.

July 25th—Went to Hand Lake and found a mountain chickadee's nest in a hollow tree, but had forgotten to bring the "bands". Later we found a baby "spotted sand-piper", and decided here-after the "bands" would go on all trips.

July 26th—Ruth pressing flowers. She and Helen have been seeing new birds all morning. The Canadian Jay came to camp and we found he imitates the Flicker. As we came in last evening about dusk discovered fresh bear sign close to camp, slept with one eye open and flashlights handy. The deer brouse around camp during the night. We went to Frog Camp, left the car and hiked to Cold-spring and Spring Lake at the foot of Sims Butte. Ruth found several plants she had not seen before and saw a 3-toed woodpecker. Spring Lake was lots higher than it was May 5th two years ago. We saw three marmots at the Rock Pile near the Guard Station on our return, but too late to get pictures.

July 27th—Started to Huckleberry Lake but found too much water in the road to drive in and too late to hike in as we spent too much time at West Lava, photographing Blue Penstemmen's and a baby sand-piper. Found remains of a horned lark. We haven't seen any chipmunks

on this side of the summit, but a few east of the summit.

July 28th—Trip to Little Belknap. Went on over to the foot of Big Belknap but too much snow so did not try to climb—5 o'clock time we got back to the car. Back at camp millions of mosquitoes were waiting for us. We lost no time getting our nets on.

July 29th—Spent morning around camp. Learned to flip pancakes. Saw the only "white Rhododendrum" on the Lake edge and thousands of tadpoles swimming in formation, they made perfect "V's". At 2 p. m. we drove up to the Huckleberry road and left the car and hiked into Huckleberry Lake $\frac{3}{4}$ miles. Pretty Lake and at one shallow place we saw the foot-print of a huge bird, probably sand hill crane, maybe an Ostrich?

Friday, July 30th—Left for Scott mountain at 8 a. m. reached top at 11:30. Had to climb in quite a bit of snow. Found a big patch of Canadian thistles on top of the mountain and several nice lava bombs as we descended the south slope (we are going back some other day for

the ones we couldn't carry in). We went over to the "Tenas Lakes" and Ruth used up the last of her movie film. When we got back to camp Helen said "now if you will unlock the back of the car I'll get my lunch". We thought she was "mountain-sick" the reason she did not eat when we did.

July 31—All have our hair up on curlers and busy pressing plants and identifying flowers and birds, and wrapping vegetables in wet paper to cook in the hot ashes for our dinner. About 3 p. m. left for Benson Lake. We had forgotten how steep the trail was the first two miles, but so glad we came. It's the loveliest of all the many lakes up here, rather late getting back to camp. Found few charred remains of what we were going to have for dinner.

Aug. 1—Broke camp, watch clouds that looked like rain, had lunch at Sparks ranch, stopped to have another look at the baby night-hawks and photographed them. The rain overtook us at Walterville. One lovely week we would like to live over again.—Myrtie.

Where Have I Been?

Since the army blundered on their orders and sent me back to Eugene to study, Nellie Moore asked me to say a few words about where I had been with the army.

Here goes! First I was at Fort Knox where it was so cold all the time that we could scarcely look out the window without becoming frozen. Next it was Arkansas where everyone drags around in the heat and never says anything without a "yo-all". After two months maneuvering in the Louisiana swamps, we were sent to the California desert. Too much dust and no water were our "worst" worries. Camp Cooke, Cal., was our next station. It is right on the ocean with typical Oregon" weather. Being a tank commander, I did my sight seeing the "hard" way. However, it is wonderful to be back in Eugene even tho they are trying to make a Russian out of me.—Chester Pietka.

September 12th work trip at cabins—only seven went, but Dorr said they got all the work done that he had planned. Patched the roof over the kitchen, cleaned the grounds hauled in a lot of bark for winter wood, put linoleum on the counters, and ate enough for a week. 
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
