Obsidian Summer Camp,  
August 4 to 18, 1946**

**PROSPECTUS**

The eighteenth annual summer camp will be held in beautiful Jefferson Park from August 4th to 18th, 1946. This is the time of year to actually begin the planning of spending those two weeks in this grand wonderland.

**LOCATION**

From Eugene, one travels by way of Jefferson, Mill City, Detroit, Breitenbush Hot Springs to Breitenbush Lake, where the cars are left with the Ranger. Here take the Skyline trail five easy miles (no lava beds) to the Park.

Camp will be established near good clear mountain water with that big Mt. Jefferson rising right from the floor of the valley, where also abound seven or eight cold mountain lakes, beside Russell Lake which affords swimming as well as fishing.

This large natural park with its many varieties of subjects will accomodate all types of campers, with the many colorful flowers in these high mountain meadows, hikes, picture taking, exploring to the bottom of the great canyon at the East end of the park and then the ultimate climb of this 10,495 foot Mt. Jefferson.

**COST OF OUTING**

The cost of two weeks outing for members \$37.50.

Non members \$39.50.

One week Member \$20. Non member \$25.

Day rates will be Member \$3.50. Non member \$4.

This includes packing from Breitenbush lake of all food and dunnage and all meals in the park.

#### REGISTRATION

Registration will be made at Hendershotts, and will close July 27th. A \$10 deposit is requested on signing and the balance before leaving for camp. All money may be given any member of the committee or at Hendershotts.

#### TRANSPORTATION

Transportation will be by privately owned cars and arranged with the driver. The usual rate per mile prevails.

#### BAGGAGE

Baggage must be securely tied in rolls or in dunnage bags. It must be labeled and tied well for the pack trip into camp. Each person is limited to 35 pounds of dunnage. Excess weight will be charged at 10c per pound.

Baggage must be left at Bailey Castelloe's (1390 Oak St.) by July 27th.

#### EQUIPMENT

Bring a sleeping bag. Nights are cold, so bring an extra blanket. Air mattresses add much in comfort, but are not absolutely necessary.

The following are indispensable:

1. A good bed.
2. Heavy hiking shoes, not necessarily high but preferably hobbled.
3. Heavy wool socks.
4. Colored glasses.
5. Suitable hiking clothes.
6. Small first aid kit.
7. Sunburn prevention.
8. Small knapsack or pack.
9. Drinking cup or canteen.
10. Flashlight.
11. Swim suit.

Reduce personal belongings to minimum. The club will furnish dishes, cooking utensils, a cook

to prepare meals, first aid equipment, lanterns in camp, and such climbing equipment as ropes and ice axes.

#### RULES AND REGULATIONS

Persons attending this outing are expected to comply with a few simple rules which have been found necessary for the safety and harmony of such an expedition.

Any person, whether members of the club or not are cordially invited to attend the outing. The purpose of these Obsidian outings is to make it possible for outdoor lovers to visit the outdoors in comfort.
