1947 OBSIDIAN SUMMER OUTING

Little Switzerland of America To Be Site of Obsidian Camp -- August 3 to 17, 1947

Prospectus

The nineteenth annual summer camp will be held on the shores of John Henry Lake in the Wallawas from August 3rd to 17th, 1947. The Wallowa mountain country is noted for its scenic beauty and because of the many lakes, mountains and rocky terrain, it is often referred to as "The Little Switzerland of America. Begin now to make your plans to be with us this summer. Put your John Henry on the sign-up sheet in Hendershotts for John Henry Lake.

Location

From Eugene we travel over the McKenzie Pass to Redmond. Go north on Highway 97 to Biggs on the Columbia Highway. Then follow Highway 30 (the Columbia Highway) east to Pendleton and La Grande. From there northeast on Highway 82 through Elgin, Minam, Wallowa to Lostine. Leave the main highway at this point and turn south, follow the Forest Service road up the Lostine River Canyon to Roy Schaeffers Lap-over Pack Camp. From Eugene to La Grande 402 miles, La Grande to Lostine 56 miles, to Schaeffers Camp 16 miles. A total mileage of 474 miles.

We start hiking from the 15 milepost on the road, up the Bowman Creek Trail 6 miles to John Henry Lake. There is a climb of 2600 ft. to the saddle between Brown and Wilson Basins then drop 800 ft. to the lake.

John Henry Lake, which covers an area of about 10 acres and is at an elevation of 7000 ft., is located off the main Bowman Trail. Peaks in this region are not particularly difficult to ascend but are reached only after covering some fairly rugged terrain. Generally they rise only a few hundred feet above the rough, steep ridges at their bases. A trip to any one of them is well worth while and the scenery is outstanding. A few peaks are Flagstaff Point 8400

ft., Lookout Mt. 8800 ft., Sturgil Peak 9300 ft., Mazel Mt. 8200 ft., Minam Peak 8000 ft. Because of the rugged country surrounding them, the peaks offer better climbs than their elevations may suggest.

There are numerous lakes accessible from camp. All are stocked and afford excellent fishing at times. They are erratic in that one may fish for hours without a strike and then suddenly the fish begin to bite and the limit may be taken in a short time. Wood, Hobo, Bear, Chimney, Laverty, Steamboat, Long, Maxwell and Green Lakes may all be fished from camp. The North Minam Meadow affords excellent fishing at all times and can also be reached from camp.

This is new territory for our photographers so be sure and bring your camera with lots of film. Let's get some good shots for the picture contest.

Cost of Outing

The cost of the two weeks outing for members is \$40.00, non-members \$45.00. One week for member \$22.50; non-members \$25.00.

This includes packing from the road to John Henry Lake and all meals in Camp. Transportation will be by privately owned cars and arranged for by the Committee. Each camper is responsible for his own transportation and other costs to and from the Wallowa. It is suggested that the drivers be paid \$5.00 each way or \$10.00 for the round trip.

Saddle horses will be available for those who desire them at \$4.00 a day.

Registration for same will close July 20th.

Equipment

The Club furnishes some tents but it is suggested that members who have tents bring them and include them in their dunnage. Bring a sleeping bag. Nights are cold, so bring an extra blanket. Air mat-

Sterling Behnke, as general chairman of the meet, did an excellent job of prior planning and one the spot execution that required a mighty good organizer. Doris Sims and Sterling Patterson did a fine job in selling the tickets. They and their committee, forsook almost all opportunity to witness the meet, spending nearly the entire day on the trail selling tickets, and they deserve cheers!

George Korn well deserves the sobriquet of "Little Beaver", with his super-abundance of tireless energy. He arranged for the P.A. system, which did much to put the tournament on a "big time" basis. Earliest Climb of Jack

On that other sunny skiing Sunday in February, two former Junior Obsidians donned ski boots, Bramanis and crampons to test the mountaineering merits of the two footgears. So to Three Fingered Jack they skied, cached their skies at the notch of the south ridge and found it easy crampon going along the knife edge aretes; the traverse was dry but poor footing was offered with crampons, necessitating considerable belaying. Base of chimney was reached with little difficulty, but even with the chimney clear of ice, climbing was impossible with either crampons, bramanis, or ski boots, so Bill Unsoeld shed his shoes and sox and negotiated the vertical ascent **barefoot**. Friend Gudman Kaarhus sent up his shoes on the rope and they reached the summit with sufficient time left for a hasty descent, for the earliest climb of Jack on or off the record. Bill and Gudman, who climbed last summer in the Tetons with Norman Bright of McKinley and Arctic fame, maintain the trip was purely for research and sagely concluded that gravel sticks between your toes when climbing without shoes!

tresses add much to comfort, but are not absolutely necessary.

The following are indispensable

1. A good bed.
2. Heavy hiking shoes, not necessarily high, but preferably hobbed.
3. Heavy wool socks.
4. Colored glasses.
5. Suitable hiking clothes.
6. Small first aid kit.
7. Sunburn prevention.
8. Small knapsack or pack.
9. Drinking cup or canteen.
10. Flashlight.
11. Swim suit.

Reduce personal belongings to a minimum. The club will furnish dishes, cooking utensils, a cook to prepare meals, first aid equipment, lanterns in camp, and such climbing equipment as ropes and ice axes.

Baggage

Baggage must be securely tied in rolls or in dunnage bags. It must

be labeled and tied well for the pack trip into camp. Allowed weights are as follows:

	with tents	without tents
2 weekers	40 lbs.	35 lbs.
1 weekers	30 lbs.	25 lbs.

Excess weights will be charged for at 10c a pound.

Tents and dunnage bags must be left at Bailey Castelloes (1390 Oak Street) by July 26th. Keep your sleeping bags with you but have them at Schaeffers Pack Camp before noon August 4th.

Rules and Regulations

Persons attending this outing are expected to comply with a few simple rules which have been found necessary for the safety and harmony of such an expedition. As is customary in all Obsidian camps, no firearms or dogs are allowed.

Registration

Any person, whether a member of the club or not, is cordially invited to attend the outing. The summer camp provides an opportunity for the camper to enjoy the out-of doors, fish, hike and, above all, to enjoy the fellowship of others who like the out of doors.

Registration will be made at Hendershotts and will close by July 26th. A \$10.00 deposit is requested on signing and the balance before leaving for camp. All money may be paid at Hendershotts or to any member of the Outing Committee.

If registering for only one week, be sure and indicate whether you will attend the first or second week of the outing.

C.A.P. Makes Contact With Obsidians on Jack Butte

An Obsidian ski trip was made in to Jack Butte from Santiam Lodge April 13 under clear sky. By previous arrangement with the Civil Air Patrol, airplane contact was made with the Obsidian party. Signals were exchanged messages and supplies were dropped. This was a practice mission simulating the type of contact which would be maintained between air and ground rescue groups in an actual airplane crash situation. Future training exercises of this type are being planned in which radio communication will be used and more advanced supply technique will be used. Piloting the Taylorcraft airplane was E. L. Harris, C.A.P. wing commander; co-pilot, navigator and observer was Bob Pfeiffer. Obsidians on the ski trip were Duane Brown, leader, Ray Sims, Doris Sims, Ernie Keasling, Arlene Brant, Adeline Adams, Gilbert Bissell, Max Cox, Bill Gill, and Bob Lyon.

The board decided to provide classifications cards at a cost of 25c each for those Obsidian skiers who wished to enter competition, and to pay the entry fees for those entering

PNSA sanctioned ski meets, providing they enter as Obsidians.

Three Senior Associate members were accepted: Chloeann Owens, Rt. 2, Box 405, Springfield; Donald G. Brown, 1414 Kincaid St., Eugene; and Marva E. Hutchison, 1239 Washington St., Eugene.

Junior Obsidians Predominate In Hoodoo Meet



Vegetation at the botto mwas that of Mexican deserts while the rim was in a heavy pine forest.
