John Henry Lake, which covers an area of about 10 acres and is at an elevation of 7000 ft., is located off the main Bowman Trail. Peaks in this region are not particularly difficult to ascend but are reached only after covering some fairly rugged terrain. Signals were exchanged messages and supplies were dropped. This was a practice mission simulating the type of contact which would be maintained between air and ground rescue groups in an actual airplane crash situation. Future training exercises of this type are being planned in which radio communication will be used and more advanced supply technique will be used. Piloting the Taylorcraft airplane was E. L. Harris, C.A.P. wing commander; co-pilot, navigator and observer was Bob Pfeiffer.
