SUMMER OUTING**

August 8th to 22nd

The twentieth annual summer camp will be held on the shores of Husband Lake in our own Three Sisters region this year. Camp was held there in 1942 and those who were there then liked it so well they wanted to go back again. Our destination can be approached from the north or the south. To reach it from the south, we leave Eugene and travel via the Willamette Hiway to just a ways past Odell Lake, then turn north on the Century Drive past Davis Lake to where the road turns off to the left into Wickiup Plains. We leave our cars at the barricade on the Skyline Trial, a distance of about 125 miles. The hike from here is north along the Skyline Trail past the Rock Mesa, drop down across Mesa Creek, then up and down crossing James Creek, Hinton Creek, Separation Creek and up over Foley Ridge to the head of Linnton Meadows. We leave the main trail here and turn off to the west to the foot of the Husband and the shores of Husband lake, a distance of about 7 miles.

To approach from the north drive up the McKenzie Hiway to Frog Camp about 72 miles, take the trail to Sunshine Shelter turning off at White Branch Crossing on to the Obsidian trail, coming in to the Skyline Trail at Obsidian Camp, follow the Skyline Trail south to the head of Linnton Meadows, or turn off and drop down into the foot of the Meadows and come up to Husband Lake, a distance of about 9 miles. Either way is a good hike on a good trail. There is a little more climbing by this trail.

Our Camp site is on the shores of a very beautiful lake nestling at the base of the Husband Mt. Looking towards the east across the head of the Meadows, we have the South Sister on the right and the Middle Sister on the left. Sunsets will leave a most gorgeous alpine glow on the old South Sister. Twilight silhouettes the Husband against the sky line and evening shadows stealing across the lake make a never-to-be-forgotten

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**Summit Certificates and

Beginning with the climb of Mt. McLoughlin, the leader of each official Obsidian climb will issue summit certificates for all persons reaching the summit. In addition to the issuance of summit certificates, the Climbing Committee has adopted two awards for recognition of mountaineering achievement. The award in the nature of a certificate which will list the names of the mountains and the date of the climb. The "Three Sisters Award" will be issued to members who climb each of the Three Sisters on official Obsidian climbs. The "Cascades Award" will be issued to members who climb each of the following peaks on official Obsidian climbs:

- Three-Fingered Jack
- Mt. Washington
- North Sister
- Middle Sister
- South Sister
- Diamond Peak
- Mt. Thielsen
- Mt. McLoughlin

In issuing the awards, recognition will be given to official climbs made in the past where the records of the club will substantiate the members statements. Application must be made for each award and forms for this purpose will be provided at a later date.

Following breakfast Gretchen is to be taken on a tour of the city and up to the University where Tri-Delt sorority will entertain with luncheon. Saturday afternoon she will be honorary referee at the U. of O. football game. In the evening the University of Oregon Ski Club has a dinner planned.

7 p.m. and 9 p.m. are the times set for showings of the full color pictures "1948 WINTER OLYMPICS" by Hans Thorner. The skiing and skating in these pictures are the world's best! The place—Roosevelt Junior High auditorium. Tickets are 50c, 75c, and \$1.00 tax inc. During intermission of the pictures Gretchen Fraser will make a personal appearance.

Obsidians Sponsor Three Meets

Branching out considerably from the competitive ski program so well begun last season the Club has chalked up more firsts in the post-war revival of central Cascade skiing. To begin with was the All-Oregon Downhill and Slalom Combined meet for both men and women in Class C and Juniors, held under ideal weather conditions at Hoodoo Bowl on February 29th. According to PNSA officials George Henderson, Hal Laman, Russ McJury and Rosemary Young who worked mightily in wresting the hord of contestants through the finish gates, it was the biggest one-day ski affair ever put on in the Northwest. Two weeks later, March 14th at the Willamette, came our All-Oregon Cross-country meet for both men and women in "C", Junior and Juvenile classes under the chairmanship of George Korn. Winner in the six mile Class C race was Marvin Anderson of the Blue Mountain Ski Club and in the Junior Boy's three mile run was Don Temple. The banquet at McCredie Springs following the meet really topped off in a grand way a very successful undertaking. Third and last of the club's PNSA sanctioned competitive events was the two-run slalom meet open to junior boys and girls of the Central Cascade Council clubs at Hoodoo on April 4th. Twenty-five entered the meet which had originally been scheduled as a giant slalom, but was changed by race chairman John Skillern due to adverse weather. A feature worthy of note in this year's program has been the large percentage of our own club members who have raced in these meets.

The Husband is there to be climbed two or three times to work up an appetite, Eileen Lake isn't far away, maybe we'll see some bear cubs again. Of course the South Sister and the Middle will be climbed. There's always the Meadows to be explored, the Giant Springs to be visited, the flowers to be admired and the pollywogs in their ponds to be played with. Maybe we will be lucky enough to see the elk herd which inhabits those parts and maybe we'll have some deer visit us in camp. Last time a badger was sighted on one of the trips. We haven't mentioned all the trips we can take nor all the sights we will see, just ask anyone who was there in '42 if it isn't a pretty grand place to spend your vacation.

Cost of Outing

The cost of the two weeks outing for members is \$40.00, non-members \$45.00. One week for members \$22.50; non-members \$25.00. Per day \$4.00 for members; \$4.50 for non-members. This includes packing and all meals in camp. Transportation will be by privately owned cars and arranged for by the committee. Each camper is responsible for the cost of his own transportation and should be prepared to reimburse the driver at the rate of 1½c per mile. **Register at Hendershotts before August 1st.**

Equipment

The Club furnishes some tents but it is suggested that members who have tents bring them and include them in their dunnage. Bring a sleeping bag. Nights are cold, so bring an extra blanket. Air mattresses add much to comfort, but are not absolutely necessary.

The following are indispensable:

1. A good bed.
2. Heavy hiking shoes, not necessarily high, but preferably hobbled.
3. Heavy wool socks.
4. Colored glasses.
5. Suitable hiking clothes.
6. Small first aid kit.
7. Sunburn prevention.
8. Small knapsack or pack.
9. Drinking cup or canteen.
10. Flashlight.
11. Swim suit.

Reduce personal belongings to a minimum. The club will furnish dishes, cooking utensils, a cook to prepare meals, first aid equipment, lanterns in camp, and such climbing equipment as ropes and ice axes.

Baggage

Baggage must be securely tied in rolls or in dunnage bags. It must be labeled and tied well for the pack trip into camp. Allowed weights are as follows:

Persons attending this outing are expected to comply with a few simple rules which have been found necessary for the safety and harmony of such an expedition. As is customary in all Obsidian camps, no firearms or dogs are allowed.

Registration

Any person, whether a member of the club or not, is cordially invited to attend the outing. The summer camp provides an opportunity for the camper to enjoy the out-of-doors, fish, hike and, above all, to enjoy the fellowship of others who like the out-of-doors.

Registration will be made at Hendershotts and will close by August 1st. A \$10.00 deposit is requested on signing and the balance before leaving for camp. All money may be paid at Hendershotts or to any member of the Outing Committee.

If registering for only one week, be sure and indicate whether you will attend the first or second week of the outing; if coming for a few days be sure to indicate what days.

Ice Skating Party



It will be good news to Obsidians that the Willamette Forest Service have secured approval of the exchange of timber for the strip of private land between the highway and McKenzie river opposite and for almost a mile below the Belknap fire-guard camp. This means that that much more of the beautiful McKenzie highway will be saved from destruction—right opposite our mountain cabin, and on the way to our

favorite mountains, the Three Sisters. Thanks and congratulations, Supervisor Bruckart.

One of the outstanding ski trips of the season was to Crater Lake on April 18. A party of 48 went by chartered bus, leaving at 5 a.m. and arriving at the lake at 10.

The snow was unusually good, and it was a real Spring day. The bus driver, Clarence Chase, was most accommodating and made 3 trips from the lodge to government camp to pick up skiers after they had ridden the trail.

It has been suggested that this be made an annual trip. Geo. Korn was the leader.

Mt. McLoughlin May 29-30-31

Mt. McLoughlin is the southernmost peak of the Oregon Cascades and is the 1st major climb scheduled by the Climbing Committee. This peak is about half-way between Crater Lake and the California border and in the immediate vicinity of Lake-of-the-woods, which can be reached either by Fort Klamath or Klamath Falls. This trip is open to the public and prospective members are cordially invited to join us on this three-day trip. We will probably be sleeping out two nights so it will be an excellent opportunity for inexperienced climbers to get that much needed experience in making an overnight bivouac. Mt. McLoughlin at this time of the year will be an all-snow climb and will be conducted as a practice trip with instruction in snow and ice technique. On the return trip home, a side trip to Crater Lake is optional with car drivers. The number on this trip will be limited to the extent that transportation is available. Sign up early to be assured of transportation. The Sign-up sheet is at Hendershotts now and registration will close Wednesday, May 26.—Willis Caldwell, Leader.

Middle Sister June 19-20

This trip is the one trip of the season that all true Obsidians should make a special effort to attend. It will be open to the public as usual and all prospective members should not miss this rare opportunity to join the club in its annual pilgrimage to the summit of the Middle Sister. This climb will be conducted under the personal supervision of the Climbing Committee who will make it both interesting and education. See sign-up sheet at Hendershotts for complete details, required equipment, etc.

Three-Fingered Jack June 26-27

This trip will give you an opportunity to climb a real mountain with a minimum of effort. While this

peak is of relatively low elevation, it offers plenty of mountaineering problems and the ascent will prove interesting and exciting. Only people in good physical condition, with steady nerves and with some previous experience in rock climbing should attempt the trip. The size of the party will be limited so consult the sign-up sheet for complete details and sign up early if you want to go.

Mt. Shasta July 3, 4, 5

This is another three-day trip and everyone interested should make a special effort to go as it may not be scheduled again for two or three years as it is the plan of the Climbing Committee to utilize the two and three-day holidays for climbing the more distant peaks of the Northwest. A two-mile back pack is required on this trip to reach the 8,000 ft. bivouac at Horse Camp. As this mountain is 4,000 ft. higher than the Three Sisters, those permitted to go on this climb must be in good physical condition, have sound heart and lungs, be in normal health, and must have climbed at least one mountain this year. **There will be no exceptions to this requirement.** (Two or three previous climbs this season are recommended for this climb).

Eugene High Third in State Meet

A downhill and slalom team composed of five Obsidians brought third place honors to Eugene high school in the annual Oregon High School meet for the Dartmouth trophy at Mt. Hood on April 10th. First in the field of nine high school teams was Grant High of Portland with Bend taking second position in team scoring. Individual honors went to Phil Gillis of Bend who lead in both downhill and slalom events for a clear cut win in the combined. The top Eugene racer was Bruce Chase with a third in the downhill, ninth in slalom and fifth in combined. Others composing the Eugene team were: John Kerns, Gilbert Bissell, Joe Gardner and Jack Napper.

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BOARD MEETINGS

Wm. H. Byrd was made an active member on consideration of his climbing record. The resignation of Marion Bradshaw was accepted. Bob Keeney, LeRoy Farnham, and John Merrill were dropped.

Gilbert Sprague was host to the board on March 8. At this time, in answer to a request from the Chemeketans, Dorr Hamlin was appointed to receive information regarding the forthcoming Federation Convention for which the former will be hosts. Ernie Keasling for Local Walks Com. announced a complete summer schedule, and Willis Caldwell presented the climbing schedule, both of which were approved by the board. Club house statistics were reviewed by Doran McKee, with promise of further study by the committee. Helen Smith reported plans progressing well for Winter Outing; Mildred Vaughan touched on events to come—St. Patrick's Day Potluck, Sadie Hawkins Ice Skating Party, and Folk dancing; Dorr Hamlin turned in Lodge fees from the Valentine party and reported all o.k.; Frank Sipe described the proposed Fall Creek For-estry trip, May 2.

On April 12, the board convened at the secretary's home, and committee reports were heard as follows: Helen Smith reported a total attend-

ance of 31 at the Winter Outing, with all kinds of weather during the week. She stated that the Summer Outing prospectus would appear in the May Bulletin. Ernie Keasling displayed the new schedules and it was decided that they would not be mailed out, but would be available at Hendershott's, from Ernie at the 1st Nat. Bank, and from Ray Sims at the U. S. Nat.l Bank, a notice to be put in the Register-Guard to that effect. However, a copy would be mailed to each trip leader, along with copies of the sign-up sheet and report blank. The motion carried to print new sign-up sheets, amended to include the new schedule of climbing fees; a new supply of report blanks were also to be obtained. After much discussion, the motion carried to raise the suggested transportation fee from 1c per mile to 1½c per mile. Willis Caldwell announced the first field trip for climbing instruction April 25 at the Coburg Caves, in conjunction with the scheduled hike to Baldy. He presented a Code of Climbing regulations, drawn up by his committee, and also a budget of estimated revenue and expenditures, which included the purchase of 1,000 Summit Certificates, 500 Three Sisters Awards, 500 Cascade Awards, 2 Nylon ropes, 3 Manila ropes, 2 First Aid Belts, 10 Summit Registers, and 200 feet of ¼" Manila rope.

The motion carried to approve the climbing code and to accept the budget, instructing the climbing committee to make the purchases suggested therein. Mildred Vaughan reported on the above mentioned parties; Nellie Moore described the progress of the scrapbook. Cliff Stalsberg stated that the club had 16 checks to go before using up the supply and suggested that a good looking design be selected for the next printing. The motion carried to empower the Treasurer to use his judgment in this matter. He stated that the bank balance was near \$500.00 and suggested that a transfer to 1st Fed. Sav. & Loan Assoc. be made soon. Roxie Waldorf asked for committee reports for the coming issue of the Bulletin, to be out about May 15. The July issue will also come in the middle of the month to accommodate the Outing Committee. The board decided to check up on unpaid dues at its next meeting. Roxie Waldorf invited the group to meet at her home in May. The meeting was then given over to a description by George Korn of the Gretchen Fraser banquet in Portland, and the proposed celebration to be put on by the Obsidians and the U. of O. Ski Club, for Gretchen on May 21, 22, and 23.

At the May board meeting the following new members were approved: Senior Active: Bernice Britton; Senior Associate: Trilla Korn, Charles B. Rodman, Wilma M. Rodman; Junior: Bill Sloan, and Marvin Yoha. The resignation of Margaret Hines was accepted.
