

Obsidians will be proudly showing off their corner of "God's Earth", to skiers from all over the Northwest, on the morning of April 28. Glen and Ray Sims, and Bailey Castelloe, with assistance from Doris Sims, PNSA Ski Touring Chairman, will lead a special tour across the McKenzie Pass Highway, packing the trail for the competitors in the JOHN CRAIG MEMORIAL SKI RACE, who will follow four hours later.

The Obsidians, working with the Tri-Pass Ski Club, sponsors of the race, will be giving the non-racer the opportunity to see the magnificent McKenzie country under its white blanket - making it possible for more to share in the wonderful spirit of this type of skiing. Also, through the combined attraction of tour and race, it is hoped to familiarize more skiers with touring.

The racers, scheduled to leave the starting gates at Windy Point, east of the Pass, at 11 a.m., will run approximately 18 miles, finishing at Alder Springs, on the west side. One of the most interesting classes will probably be that of the veterans, men over 35. # OUR GREAT WILDERNESS LABORATORY

All who know the thrill of high country and wilderness domain cannot but be pleased with the plans of the Forest Service to establish new Wild Areas in the Cascades and adjoining regions as described in the August-September 1950 issue of the Obsidian. These, with the already dedicated Three Sisters Wilderness Area which it is stated, "will remain substantially the same so far as recreational values are concerned", will provide a greater range of the wonderful recreational opportunities right in our back yard, or is it in our front yard?

But what does this about the Three Sisters Wilderness Area "remaining substantially the same" mean? Simply that, as stated in the above-mentioned article, the Forest Service, finding much of the western part of this Area apparently of little recreational value, decided to open it to timber harvesting without considering other possible values.

It is felt that the very important value of this region has not received sufficient consideration, that it is a perfect laboratory for scientific research the like of which does not exist, so far as the writer knows, in such a sizable, continuous, and almost undisturbed condition in any of the wilderness, wild, virgin or natural areas of the western ranges. It extends from the ten thousand three hundred foot elevation down to nineteen hundred feet at its western border. It contains four life zones in which the higher plants and animals are known but of its lower forms not so much is known. Adequate collections of such plants as fungi, liverworts, etc., and of such animals as salamenders, frogs, lizards, etc., have not yet been made.

For a thorough knowledge of the region the scientific studies could well take the form of research in:

- 1. The formations of the region and its soils.
- 2. The erosion that has been checked and that which is operating now.
- 3. The past and present climates.
- 4. The comparative humidities with this and cut-over and other disturbed regions.
- 5. The type, conditions and values of the watersheds.
- 6. The higher and lower flora and fauna: Their range, food, tolerance (increasing or dying out); Their parasites, diseases, etc.
- 7. Making adequate collections of all life forms to be preserved for immediate study and for comparison with findings in this and other regions as time goes on.
- 8. The study of the record of the age-long struggles, adjustments, failures and victories of plants and animals in their fight to survive the hazards of natural forces. This record is of first importance as a source of scientific study of Nature's processes which developed the life forms now present. It is of equal importance as a place where Nature's future developments of life forms and ecological conditions can be studied undisturbed to take their natural course, something which can never be done unless a specific area such as this is dedicated to the purpose. THIS STUDY HAS THE GREATEST SCIENTIFIC VAL-UE OF ALL THOSE LISTED HERE.

This record of the "wisdom of the ages" is for us to preserve and study. To preserve and study not just for ourselves but for the use of productive scientists from all over the world.

# RESOLUTION APPROVED

A resolution asking for a delay in action of the change in boundary of The Three Sisters Wilderness Area was passed both by the Princesses and the Obsidian board. This was done to allow time for a survey of the region in question so that a more comprehensive study of its scientific value could be made. Further research has uncovered scientific material here which is found nowhere else.
