



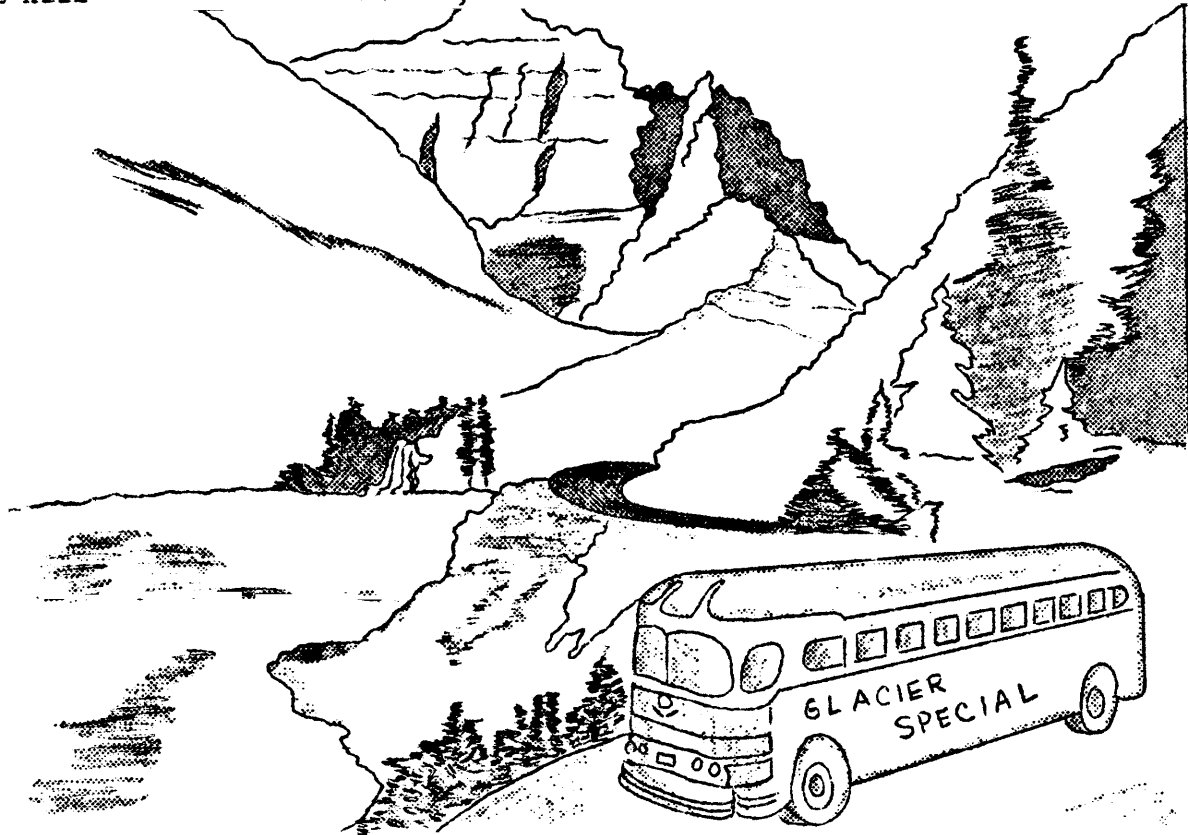

Glacier has over 200 individual lakes, some 60 glaciers, with over 1,000 miles of well-marked trails. Won't you join us in exploring and enjoying this bit of nature's wonderland. Skiing should be enjoyed both Saturday and Sunday. For those who don't ski there is the tramway to ride, places of interest at Government Camp to visit.

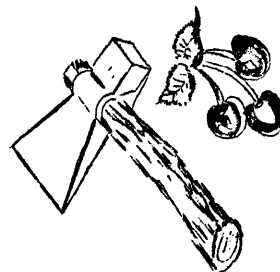
Saturday night at the Lodge there will be entertainment for all. Companionship with members of the Mazama and Trails Clubs will be another highlight of the outing.
