

Annual Ski Tour - April 26th

For the third year the JOHN CRAIG MEM-ORIAL SKI TOUR will be held over historic McKenzie Pass. This time it will go "down-hill", east to west, starting at 4 Mile Springs and terminating at Alder Springs.

Tentative plans are shaping up by the Obsidians, sponsors of the tour, and the Tri-Pass Ski Club, sponsors of the cross-country ski race. General chairman George Korn and Co-chairman Harold Trotter, the originator of the idea, say that snow conditions the past week will assure snow the length of the course.

The Obsidian Ski Committee consisting of Mike Stahl, Doris Sims, Clarence Bankhead and Glen Sims are working out details

for a bigger and better tour. The Ski Patrol will also take an active part.

The annual letter sale will have a new twist with an antique auto race from Mc-kenzie Bridge to Eugene picking up the mail along the route. These letters help underwrite the promotion, trophies and the dining and lodging of the ski tour and race contestants.

Skiing will be in order at Hoodoo Bowl Saturday previous to the race with tour and race headquarters at Santiam Lodge. Sunday morning the tour will proceed to the McKenzie Pass and, with the ski patrol, pave the way for the racers. The banquet after the race will be held on the McKenzie side at the McKenzie High School. The finish of the race on this side should be of a great deal of interest to Obsidians not wishing to make the trip over the pass. Send a letter to a friend, too.

CRATER LAKE - APRIL 12, 1953

APRIL 12TH is the day we fill one or more Greyhound busses for that annual trip to CRATER LAKE. This will be the fifth year that the Obsidians have sponsored this grand "ski and take pictures" trip.

The one Greyhound driven by Clarence Bankhead in 1948 proved to be such a perfect trip, that in 1949, one hundred fourteen people went on that one day winter trip to Crater Lake, in THREE Greyhounds. And it was lucky for those, because 1949 is the only time that Crater Lake was completely frozen over. Two busses were loaded for both the 1950 and 1951 trips, but last year's trip was interrupted by the bus strike.

May 30 & 31 - THREE FINGERED JACK

This two day trip will climax the Climbing School's course with a good stiff climb. WHAT THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS DID AT THEIR MARCH MEETING

- . . .approved the schedule of hikes for the year prepared by Gust's Trips Committee. An interesting schedule of new places has been planned as well as including some of the "old favorites". Some fine weekend outings are also on the schedule.
- . . .approved Sebring-Plaisted's Climbing Committee schedule for the summer. It begins with a series of climbing school sessions and embraces much of the Cascade Range, including southern Washington and Northern California.
- . . . heard Scientific and Conservation Committee chairman Sipe make an appeal for all Obsidians to join the Federation of Western Outdoor Clubs. Membership is only \$1.00 a year, and while a small donation it is a big help to the FWOC cause for conservation. A quarterly publication is sent contribu-Sipe, who is probably the club's foremost exponent of conservation, also urged club members to write their Senators and Representatives to vote in favor of This bill if passed would Bill HR 1972. allow the U.S. Forest Service to spend 10% of their receipts to maintain parks. Scientific Committee has been successful in securing services of U.S. Forest Service men to conduct trips for the Obsidians this summer.
- . . .welcomed and approved membership of Tracy Caldwell and Tim Moriarty. Watch for these new members and get acquainted with them.
- . . .gave a "go-ahead" to Building Committee Chairman Stahl to make application for organization site on the shore of Lookout Point Dam Lake. An idea was advanced that a covered shelter with fireplace and cooking facilities be built for use as a picnic area. Approved a motion to have Board members meet at Hamlin Orchard to investigate a Town House building site.
- . . .approved the plan of Ray Sims' Camera Committee to use the program sponsored by Dot Dotson at McDonald Theatre for showing Obsidian pictures to commemorate the club's 25th Anniversary. Other publicity plans for this event heard and approved.
- ...heard report of Entertainment Committee plans for Anniversary Banquet on April $18.\,$

- . . .agreed to write a letter to the Lane County Electric Co-op in support of their action to prevent construction of dams on the McKenzie River.
- . . .discussed club's participation in the John Craig Memorial Ski Race-Decided that although club could offer no financial aid to the promotion, would help if possible in carrying out the event.
