Natural History Society Meets Jan. 29

The Natural History Society will meet January 29, 8:00 P.M., in Chapman Hall, University of Oregon campus, The topic for lecture and discussion will be the Wilderness Area concept, especially as it has been developed in the United States, and features which characterize areas. Slides of various U.S. Wilderness Areas have been obtained from the United States Forest Service and will be shown to illustrate points of the discussion. Dr. Bonita Miller, who will give the talk, is especially well prepared. has taken graduate work in plant ecology at Oregon State, in Wales, and at the University of Wisconsin. It is hoped many Obsidians will be present at this program.

NEW YEAR'S PARTY

Now that the climbing and hiking are over for the season we all have more dark Sundays and long evenings to spend on reading. And what could make more satisfying reading for Obsidians than books on mountaineering?

The dramatic Annapurna started the mountaineering book cycle two years ago and initiated a wide audience into the drama and excitement of the sport. Fore-runners to Everest is an account of the 1952 Swiss expeditions that supplied the later British trip with so much useful data. Following this the book Conquest of Everest by Sir John Hunt tells the now familiar story of the successful British attempt in 1954.

As a follow-up to these titles, there is a special photographic report of the 1952 Swiss expedition to Everest that is one of the most handsome collections of mountain photographs we have ever seen. The pictures in this volume reveal the size of the accomplishment of these various undertakings.

James Ramsey Ullman has revised his well-known volume High Conquest bringing it up to date. In The Age of Mountaineering he stresses the international importance of mountaineering since the war: the American expedition to K2, the Swiss on Dhaulagiri, Austrians and Germans on Nanga Parbat, and so on.

K2 is the book about the American expedition that attempted Mt. Godwin-Austen, second highest mountain in the world. The mountain was finally conquered in August of this year by the Italians. The book is appropriately sub-titled, the Savage Mountain.

The first and only collection of its kind, A Treasury of Mountaineering Stories is an anthology of the best mountaineering literature from all over the world. Stories, both fact and fiction, mirror the challenge and excitement of a great sport. Any one or all of these books should supply many satisfying hours of reading for Obsidians.
