The regular meeting of the Obsidian Club was called to order July 10, 1957, by the President at the home of Bette Hack. Members attending were: Ray Harris, Bob Medill, Frances Newsom, Helen Hughes, Ray Cavagnaro, Karl Onthank, Henry Carlson, Natalie Beckett, Blanche Bailey, Bette Hack and George Hermach.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and the Treasurer reported a balance of \$471.18.

Entertainment: Natalie Beckett reporting: A picnic is to be held July 27th at the Water Board Park, Leaburg, with Bette Hack as chairman of the event. Since Prof. Stovall is unable to show pictures until later in the year, the evening will be spent in games and campfire with dinner at 6:30. Natalie also reported that a swimming party is being planned for sometime after Summer Camp.

Trips: George Hermach reporting. A trip to Mink Lake was announced for July 13th and 14th. The trips Committee is joining the Climbing Committee for a visit to Mt. Washington July 20th and 21st. Camp will be at Dugout Lake and Reports are this is an excellent trip.

Outing: Ray Cavagnaro reported that after some discussion with Forestry Service the route to Summer Camp is to be via Foley Ridge road. Testing of the old

stove proved it is not necessary to replace at this time.

Membership. Blanche Bailey reporting. \$4.00 for dues and car sticker was turned over to the Treasurer.

Climbing. Ray Harris reporting. The prospectus prepared for different mount-tains has been very helpful. The Committee is very enthusiastic over the way the Register-Guard has been cooperating with publicity on climbs this year.

Search and Rescue. Ray Harris reported that meetings have been dropped for the summer.

Historian. Bob Medill reporting. It was moved and carried that the Register-Guard article and picture on Jim Bryant be placed beside that of Mrs. Bryant in the scrapbook. Mr. Bryant passed away just a month and a half after Mrs. Bryant.

Conservation. Karl Onthank reporting. The Three Sisters Wilderness Trip was a through success. As many as 79 people attended throughout the four days. Camp was established at the Potholes on Olallie trail. The Committee including Dale Carlson, Margaret Markley, Jim Kezer, Ruth Hopson, Fred Behm, Prince Helfrich, Ruth Onthank, and others was thanked for an excellent and successful trip. It was suggested that action should be taken to help eliminate the Bruces Eddy dam on North Fork of the Clearwater, as it will invade the wilderness area.

The Wilderness Preservation bill came to a head last week. Copies of the Bill are available from Karl Onthank. It was moved and carried that \$25 be donated to Mrs. Polly Dyer for expenses as representative from the Northwest to appear before the Wilderness Hearing in Washington D.C.

It was also moved and the motion carried that the Federation of Western Outdoor Club dues of \$10 be paid.

Old Business. It was decided that the problem of a membership committee chairman who will also be a member of the Board and has one more term to serve be turned over to the Nominating Committee to either choose someone to fill out the term or nominate two women for election to the board next fall.


CLIMBING SCHEDULE(continued)

Mary Cavagnaro has recently from a summer institute at the graduate school of Social Welfare, University of Mary was one of California at Berkeley. six Oregon social workers chosen to tend. She enjoyed several days in High Sierra country en route, and crossed three magnificent passes; Donner, Eberts and Luther, and visited briefly at Claire Tappan, Sierra Club lodge. Mary also reports that Highway 14, opened only last August is a beautiful trip through a very isolated section of Northeastern California; and provides a considerable short cut from Klamath Falls to Susanville through pine and cedar forest. Here a completely undeveloped lake approximately the size of Klamath Lake was discovered, its shores harboring many types of nesting waterfowl, including several families of wild geese, taking their young for their first swimming lessons. Mary found that although this is excellent paved highway, one sees far less people and feels deeper in the wilderness than along the skyline trail!

Following is the first part of a long letter Dolores Jeppesen drew up to send to her friends describing her Easter vacation trip in Europe.

As the year is once again rapidly drawing to an end, I find that I am very far behind in keeping friends posted on my past, present and future activities. I do have several honest reasons for my delays though. An exceptionally large class (36-38) of very active first graders and secondly situated where I am only an hour from Munich in the heart of beautiful Bavaria, travel has comsumed many hours.

My most recent venture or more appropriately titled mis-adventure was an Easter tour by bus through Yugoslavia, a brief flight to Istanbul, Turkey, return flight to Athens, Greece and back to Yugoslavia (Continued on page 6) by train and bus, and boat up the beautiful Adriatic coastline of Western Yugoslavia. Although my experiences were beyond belief and frequently even beyond imagination, I hope my few sketches of things seen will convey just a hint of what Yugoslavia actually is.

Our journey started 2 hours late from Munich the night of April 18th with an uneventful all night ride to Venice, Italy Having been here twice for breakfast. before it was almost like a homecoming to see familiar sights again. But, misfortune struck and we were once again delayed 3 hours. As a result, Trieste, a city I have really wanted to visit was skimmed through in an attempt to reach our destination in Yugoslavia for dinner. At the border your first impression of Yugoslavia is deeply engraved. other European country an American passport is your key for a quick passage. This is not so here! First you are asked to fill out two forms in duplicate, these are then individually checked. All money of any denomination from any country must be declared accurately. Due to one lady's error we were detained 45 minutes while she was interrogated as to how such an error could occur. All cameras must be accounted for and checked by serial number and heaven help anyone who might have the misfortune of losing theirs in this country. Finally after an hour and a half, our bus was permitted to enter the barren, bleak, dry area which is northwesterly Yugoslavia. (To be continued)
