Where Do Members Want Their New Clubhouse

One of the most important Obsidian trips of the year will be Sunday Aprill3 when all club members are invited to tour some likely sites for the new clubhouse.

The group will leave from Armitage Park and the hobo breakfast scheduled for that day. Breakfast will be at 8 a.m. Those who don't eat breakfast can meet the tour in McKay's parking lot just across the Ferry St. Bridge. Rendezvous time is 10 a.m.

Guide for the tour of the building lots will be Tom Taylor who with his building committee has worked up a list of five likely sites. We will visit each and hear Tom explain the advantages and disadvantages of each.

After the tour each member will get a ballot on which he can mark his first and second choices for the new clubhouse. He will mark the ballot after he gets home, and mail it in, thus being sure he has plenty of time to think through his vote.

Obviously this is one of the most important decisions that has faced the club since it was formed. Tom hopes for at least 50 members for Sunday's tour.

The club lot at 17th and High streets is on the block for sale. When it is sold we must, for tax reasons, put proceeds at once into property we intend to use for similar purposes. So time is of the essence.

The questionnaire on the building which Tom sent out a month ago was well recoived, with a majority of members answering. A majority of them favored going ahead with building plans this year. Tom says he is pleased with the response and especially with the number who said they could donate labor, money, or building materials at low cost.

But the site must be picked, and quick. President Ray and the board urge a good turnout - Remember, if you don't vote, you have no cause to beef.

Movie and Banquet Start Obsidian Spring Season

Two Obsidian social events are set for the next two Saturday nights. Next Saturday, April 12, the club sponsors a film "Danger River" about the thrilling trip down the Grand Canyon of the Colorado. This is in the general region of the 1958 summer camp and should be of keen interest to those who plan to be in the canyon as part of their summer camp activity.

The film, a logical companion to "Canyon Voyage," the Charles Eggert film we brought to town last year, is in full technicolor, with wide screen and stereophonic sound. It will be at the South Eugene High auditorium at 8 p.m. Prices are 90 cents for adults and 50 cents for juniors. Profits go to buy search and rescue equipment.

Charles Eggert, a professional movie maker, will be in Eugene with the film.

The following Saturday night, the 19th, the club will resume, after some years abandonment, the annual spring banquet to kick off the summer hiking and climbing season. A variety of entertainment has been planned by the entertainment committee.

Featured speaker will be Dr. Raymond T. Ellickson, acting dean of the graduate school and head of the department of physics at the University of Oregon. He will talk on "Outer Space." Club President Ray Sims will be master of ceremonies.

The banquet will be at the Bethesda Lutheran Church, 4445 Royal Ave. Tickets are \$2 each, and may be purchased from members of the entertainment committee.

Middle Sister Book Now in UO Library

The original Middle Sister summit register, which was put on top of the peak in 1892 by Dean John Straub of the University of Oregon, has been turned over to the University of Oregon Library for safe keeping.

It will be in the Oregon Collection and may be examined there by club members and others.

The book, quite fragile and about ready to fall apart because of weathering and handling over the years, is a fascinating record of early-day climbs. Included in it are the signatures of Cramer and Ferry, the two boys who were lost in the Sisters in 1927. It was on the search for these two that the idea of forming the Obsidians was first broached.

Trail Cleanup

Bob Medill's trips committee has been interested in working out an arrangement under which the club could assist in the maintenance of the trails we use. Now Ray Hornbeck, McKenzie Ranger, has agreed to let us help the forest service Sunday the 15th of June in clearing either the Horse Creek or Castle Creek trails. A forester will go along. Four Members Attend Wilderness Conference

Gene Renard, Dave Simons, and Ruth and Karl Onthank participated Mar. 22-23 in the Northwest Wilderness conference in Seattle. On display was a Waldo Lake exhibit prepared by Gene and Frances Newsom. This was shown with a group of Three Sisters pictures assembled by Al Schmitz of the Mazamas.

Dave, now a University of California student, had charge of a display on the North Cascade wilderness. Many pictures he took during the past two summers while on exploring and picture trips for Sierra Club.

About 200 attended the conference which was much like that held in Portland two years ago. This one stressed more the rapid changes taking place in population and recreation.

Karl spoke for outdoor groups on a panel on "Conflicting Wilderness Philosophies" in which spokesmen for lumber, mining, hydro-power and other interests appeared.
