

This historic spot has been the scene of 3 Summer Camps, and numerous week-end events with the objective of a climb of Mt. Jefferson. This 10,500 mountain is a favorite of good climbers.

This delightful spot in the Santiam National Forest provides a wonderful variety of hikes. An abundance of lakes -- well stocked with fish is in the area.

Mt. Jefferson, midway between the north and south boundaries of Oregon was named by Capt. Clark of the Lewis & Clark expedition after President Jefferson. The first climb of the mountain was recorded in July 1897.

The mountain has five glaciers, the Whitewater Glacier being the largest in Oregon. Many parks and many lakes surround the mountain, and most of these will be visited by the campers.

This will be a pack trip, and complete arrangements will be made for you by the committee. A special price has been arranged for young folks, and special events will be planned for them.

This should be a wonderful camp, right in our own Oregon back yard. Plan to attend, tell your friends and invite them along.

BOARD NOTES

The regular monthly Obsidian Board meeting was held at Mike and Dorothy Stahl's home March 3rd at 7:30 P.M. Those present: Tom Taylor, Jim Stovall, Mike Mc-Closkey, Gerry Fehly, Ray Harris, Kay Fahy, Gene Renard, Lorena Shinn, Jim Richardson, Ray Cavagnaro, Ray Sims and Mike and Dorothy Stahl.

Gerry read the lengthy minutes of the past month. Two bills were ordered paid, - Bob Medill, \$6 for stamps and Mishler's for February, \$20.70. The Historian was absent. Membership chairman Kay reported two new members, Michael Bray and Joseph David Fehly, \$2, and \$38 also from dues. Bob steele and Mel Jackson also were voted into the club. Two were dropped - Durward Boyles and Bertha Deckmann.

Gene reported three successful trips, Feb. 21 with 20 climbers on Spencer Butte; 14 on the ski trip to Fairview Lookout in the Bohemia's Sat. Feb. 27; on Feb. 28, 7 were on the McKenzie ski trip to Proxy Creek Trail. The new schedule for April will be found on page 4.

Conservation - Mike McCloskey reported that early in April there would be a meeting of the Water Resources Board to make studies of the water uses in the streams of our area. Therefore he wishes members versed in any of the areas listed (which should be preserved for Recreation, Fish & Wild Life) to contact him. areas - McKenzie River from mouth to Leaburg Dam, Mohawk River, McKenzie from Leaburg Dam to Lane Co. line, Blue River, Quartz Creek, South Fork, Horse Creek, Willamette River from Lookout Point Dam to source, Fall Creek, North Fork, Salmon Creek, Salt Creek, Gold Lake, Waldo Lake basin, Mink Lake basin, and Scott Lake basin.

Climbing committee reported by Jim Richardson; climbing school will start with an indoor session April 6 at the Court House meeting hall, then another April 20 with outside sessions April 24,27 & May 1. On June 25 & 26 Cove Palisades; Snow & Ice School on Collier Glacier July 9-10. The rest of the climbing schedule will be printed in the regular Obsidian schedule. The board passed a motion to allow the climbing committee to purchase a new First Aid Kit. (Continued on Page 2)

BOARD MEETING (Continued)

Ray Harris reported for the President's committee of three - they wish to have the club vote a new section into the bylaws of the Obsidian Constitution to allow "Expert Climbers" to form a committee, "outside of the present climbing committee" to give advice on climbing and furnish leaders when needed on regularly scheduled Obsidian trips. It is hoped that this will fill the need of the many young climbers who last year went through the Obsidian climbing school, then climbed on the "tenderfoot" climb but did not follow on Obsidian climbs. Discussion followed.

Mike Stahl reported that the revised Constitution was ready forreading and so a special board meeting will be held at Lorena's - 1835 Jefferson - at 7:30 March 24.

Youth Committee - our two MIKE's reported that 9 advanced Boy Scouts, ages 14 to 17, received their Charter Feb. 18. The Official Scouters have recommended that this troop be designated as AN OUTDOOR POST. They planned to make a snow trip to Gold Lake March 5 & 6. It was suggested that the Obsidians help find a weekly meeting place - invite the boys to meetings.

Anna's entertainment report was read by Ray Cavagnaro - March 19 to be the next potluck, to be in charge of the men of the club - "the Chiefs". The last two potlucks - January's with the "Style Show", Ray C. as Master of Ceremonies, and February's put on by the Princesses - were superb. (the following names were unintentionally left out of the last bulletin - Helen Weiser took part in the dress parade - driving a "merry Oldsmobile" - and Ray C. was Master of Ceremonies).

Gene Sebring reported for the building committee - said that Tom Taylor has been retained as architect; if it had not rained an inch and a half a committee of five or six were to take tools and brush out some at the Obsidian lot, March 5.

NORTHWEST WILDERNESS CONFERENCE

The third biennial Northwest Wilderness Conference will be held in the Multnomah Hotel in Portland, Sat. & Sun., March 26 & 27. Theme will be wilderness administration with particular reference to such problems as the protection of wilderness from over-use -already serious in some areas and growing rapidly - pack stock vs. helicopters for wilderness transportation, wilderness protection from fire and insect pests.

Francis W. Sargent, Executive Director of the National Outdoor Recreational Resources Review Commission, is coming from Washington to speak at the Saturday evening Conference banquet on "A Progress Report from the Outdoor Recreational Resources Review Commission, Including its plans for Wilderness Studies."

Forest Service, Park Service and other "professionals" will join in panel and "free-for-all" discussion of these and other problems with speakers from the outdoor and conservation organizations and from business, industry and the public at large.

The Conference is sponsored by the Federation of Western Outdoor Clubs, and is being put on in collaboration with outdoor groups of the Northwest, such as the Trails Club and Mazamas of Portland, Mountaineers and Olympians of Puget Sound area, Obsidians of Eugene, Oregon Horsemen's Associations, and numerous others. The Izaak Walton League and Oregon Wildlife Federation are also cooperating. Mr. Paul Gerhardt, Portland lawyer, is Conference Chairman.Karl Onthank
