





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

OBSIDIAN LODGE



Gene Renard made this report at the May 5th Obsidian Board Meeting:

His committee recommended overall 1820 square feet (ground floor).

Banquet Room - 32 x 32, to seat 84 at dinner or 120 in chairs at a picture night - 1024 square feet.

Kitchen - 14 x 24 - 336 square feet.

Entry Vestibule - coat storage for 100 hangers - 12 x 24 - 288 square feet.

Toilet Rooms - (off entry) 6 x 8 - 48 square feet, and 6 x 10 - 60 square feet, total 108 square feet.

Equipment Storage - 8 x 8 - 64 square feet.

Board Room - (upstairs) 16 x 20 - 320 square feet. To have room for 20 persons - library - records - book case.

NOW - by eliminating both fire places (at present) the lodge will still cost more than we have - BUT - with all the pledges in and the new ones promised more recently - we hope not to make the lodge any smaller just because we don't have "quite enough" - more corners can be cut - so it's up to us all to lend our help.

MAY BOARD MEETING

The May 5th regular Obsidian Board meeting was held at the home of Donn Chase. Those present: Gerry Fehly, Anna Jeppesen, Gene Renard, Mike Stahl, Jim Stovall, Ray Cavagnaro, Karl Onthank, Jim Jeppesen, Kay Fahy, Frances Freedenburg, Lorena Shinn, Ray Sims, Tom Taylor and Donn Chase.

Tom opened the meeting at 8 o'clock and Gerry read minutes of the previous meeting. Ray Cavagnaro reported the checking balance as \$1,035.64. This month's bills ordered paid are: Mishler's \$30.15; Bob Medill \$6.00 for stamps; H. G. Chickering \$6.00 for picture, and Tom Taylor's fee of \$170.55 to date.

Jim Stovall reported for the Science committee and presented a Field Guide Book, a real "geology per mile" for a good deal of the state of Oregon.

Lorena has been collecting poison oak at the climbing sessions at Coburg rocks.

Kay turned in \$4.00 from dues and \$10 from five new members - Sharon Brickley, Fred Huntington, Mike Forrester and Ken D. Hertz - very glad to have you with us, new members.

Gene Renard reported trips taken -- Stolsig Butte April 10 with 18 persons, Old Baldy April 16 with 12, Klickitat only drew 2 on April 24. A general discussion of the trip schedule followed - it is ready for printing. A look into the future - on Labor Day to Devil's Garden, Mink Lake Basin and Pack Saddle Mountain. A variety to suit all.

Frances reported all items have been clipped.

The outing was reported by Donn, who with Ray Cavagnaro has made a drive to Mill City and Breitenbush, talked to the Ranger who will be glad to visit camp, and was told where to get packers. The cost of camp will be: Adults, two weeks, \$55.00; one week, \$32.50; Juniors, \$40.00 for two weeks; or \$25.00 for one week. Individual days, \$5.00. The Prospectus will be out in June.

Karl Onthank attended the Water Resources Board meeting with others from here and has been busy of late, and urges others to write to Senators Morse and Lusk of Oregon, and Jackson of Washington and to Congressman Porter concerning the Wilderness Bill and the Dunes Seashore Bill.

Karl wants a good display at the American Association for the Advancement of Science, to be held at the U. of O. June 13 to 18, 1960.

A new Conservation magazine is just out and the Board decided to have one that comes out monthly for a dollar, called National Wildlands News, sent to us this year. The F.W.O.C. Labor Day Convention will be in charge of the Mountaineers on the Hood Canal this year.

There is still time to sign a petition for getting the Bill Board bill on the ballot, if you wish.

Mike Stahl is going to cooperate with the Climbing Committee to get proper First Aid Kits for his Search & Rescue work.

Ray and Bob will have the bulletin out soon and expect to have Myrtle's drawing of the new Obsidian Lodge for a cover.

Anna reported that another potluck is planned for May 21, at the Water Board building - and urged all to come out. There were 48 at the Spring Banquet last month. Anna's committee meets regularly.

New business - Mike proposed an idea to get individual insurance on Obsidian trips for a dollar per year - will investigate

Old business - Ray Sims produced Myrtle's two drawings of plaques for Mazama Lodge - Jim said he would have one made and have it at the June Board meeting --- The Mazamas will dedicate their lodge on June 25th.

Next meeting - June 2nd - at the home of Frances Freedenburg, 1584 Escalante--out River Road, turn left on Maxwell.

Well, that voice is singing lullabies to her 10 month old daughter these days. And on Helen's birthday (Mar. 22) she had a phone call from Sitka, Alaska telling her of the birth of a son to Roy's second daughter Joan. This makes 2 great-grandchildren for Helen. To Obsidians who knew Roy and Blanche Kilpatrick they might be interested to know that Roy's oldest daughter, Gayl, is living in Idaho while her husband is studying to be a lawyer and the second daughter, Joan, lives in Sitka where her husband is a chemical engineer at the pulp mill. Roy's 3 other children attend school in John Day and Canyon City. (And Helen has just won a spelling contest in Eugene. Wonder just how tough that is going to be on the great-grandchildren to have a great-grandmother who has accomplished that, Ed)

Want to go to the Valley of the Moon? According to Dr. Howell Williams in his report on, "Ancient Volcanoes of Oregon", Bowden, Diamond and Jordan Craters of the Southeastern part of Oregon are every bit as spectacular as the Craters of the Moon in Idaho or the Modoc Lava Beds of Calif. These are called the Jordan Craters of the Malheur rangelands and are 36 miles northwest of the old town of Jordan Valley. There are four cinder cones in the Jordan crater group and are in a line and from 3 to 4 miles apart, surrounded by great sheets and flows of black lava. One flow covers about 60 square miles. Geologists say that these volcanoes were probably the last volcanic action in Oregon and putting their age at 300 years. Dr. Howell Williams says, "The ropy crusts of lava are wonderfully fresh, and tubes, gutters and pressure ridges are plentifully displayed and where liquid lava flowed and bubbled through cracks in the crusts of the flows, there are small driblet cones on the inner walls from which hang delicate stalactites formed of lava re-fused by hot gases."

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
