The Gold Lake Bog resolution is written up and will soon be signed. This will make the area a natural area, however, instead of a virgin area.

The Wilderness Conference sponsored by the Federation of Western Outdoor Clubs will be held in Seattle March 14 & 15.

A proposal is in the making to show the G. M. Wright Clear Lake cut-off road over Robinson Lake for both recreational and lumbering. Transfer for The proposed rerouting through uncut areas Earl Smith to Robinson Lake is recommended as an example of both family recreational and clear cutting.
