MT. RAINIER CLIMBING SEMINAR

Recently, Gary Kirk, a climber who has climbed with and led for the Obsidians went to Mt. Rainier for a climbing seminar. There were four sessions held this year and Gary attended the July 20-24 session. The seminar was held on Mt. Rainier with Dick McGowan in charge and Pete Schoening as guest instructor. Both are well known for their mountaineering accomplishments.

Base camp was at Camp Muir, situated at the 10,000 ft. level. The five days of the session were directed from here and this was also their eating and sleeping place while there. Evening discussions were held here also.

The first 4 days were spent in practice of different climbing methods, while the last day was the climb of Mt. Rainier.

Some of the subjects covered were: rock & snow climbing fundamentals, belaying on rock, snow & ice, rapelling (rock and snow) methods, glacial travel, advanced ice climbing techniques, crevasse rescue prac-

tice (prussik, belgeri, jumar, ascender & pulley systems), carrier evacuation, snow camping, etc.

As there was quite a bit of work with ice pitons Gary and the crew had a chance to try different kinds and Gary has come away with the firm conviction that the only kind to have or use is the screw type. These have held the weight of three men pulling on them. Gary had a chance to compare the holding power of many kinds and he says there is no comparison.

The last day they climbed to the summit of Rainier in two separate parties of 9 each. The summit was reached at 11:30 after a wonderful climb.

Gary said the whole seminar was enjoyable and informative. There were 16 climbers from all over and of different vocations which added something.

Cost of the seminar was \$95.00 -- which covered the cost of food, community climbing equipment, instruction and the climb of Rainier. When the seminar was finished, Gary felt he had really gotten a bargain.

MARY MEDILL HAS CHAMPION FALL

While visiting in Wisconsin, Mary Medill had a very bad fall breaking her thigh bone just below where it enters the pelvic socket. Bob says she has anything he could accomplish on a mountain trip topped; she fell down in Wisconsin and wound up in a hospital in Peru, Illinois.
