House Bill #1036 passed the House on Friday, April 9 by a large majority, partly due to the hard work of a few persons against the concerted efforts of the glass bottling, aluminum and beer industries,

If it passes the Senate, Oregon can be proud to be the first state to have control of throw-away containers, as this bill places a 5¢ deposit on pop and beer bottles and cans, and outlaws the flip-t top cans.

On October 5, 1960 Bob Medill and I made a short trip down Obsidion Trail from Frog Camp to retrieve the large three foot sign "The Obsidian Trai" entering the Three Sisters Wilderness.

Between Dec. 20 and 24, 1960 the skylights of our new lodge were installed and by the 24th, heavy paper and steel wire was covering the main room. By the 27th the entire room was covered with cement, with bright sunlight shining thru the open sides. The ditch was still being completed for the water line, with the road so muddy that most cars were left outside. During the latter part of December the cedar siding was placed.

One of my pictures shows Margaret Tiese high on a ladder putting on stain. The first plumbing was put in during early January, 1961, and the foundation for the fireplace was laid January 28.
