A New Building Near the Obsidian Lodge

A NEW STORAGE GARAGE HAS BEEN PROPOSED FOR THE LODGE GROUNDS. The Obsidian Board of Directors has given the go-ahead and has created an ad hoc committee to facilitate the planning and construction of the new building. The ad hoc construction committee members are Rob Castleberry, Dan Gilmore, Steve Gunn, Brian Hamilton, John Jacobsen, Steve Johnson, and Doug Nelson. If anyone else is interested in joining this committee or becoming involved in possible volunteer construction work on the project, contact me: johnwjacobsen@comcast.net.

The new storage garage will replace two low-ceilinged, dilapidated sheds that are overflowing with Summer Camp gear, grounds equipment/supplies and other odds and ends. It will also house other Summer Camp gear currently stored upstairs in the Lodge where it must be retrieved and restored via the Lodge stairs or a long hike up, around and behind the Lodge. There are also ladders, lumber, a water tank and other things currently stored outdoors which would be stored inside the new building.

The ad hoc committee has met a couple of times so far to deal with preliminary details such as the storage garage's location, general size and layout. Multiple sites were considered and a location to the southeast of the Lodge, south of the lower parking area has been selected because of the ease of access and proximity to the Lodge. The area immediately off the parking pad would require a lot of fill, while a location farther back in the woods (south) and farther from the Lodge would reduce the fill requirements considerably. We are awaiting the costing estimates to help determine the preferred spot for the building. It has been determined that a 24 ft. x 36 ft. building would be needed to handle our current storage needs, provide some work/staging space and allow for future storage needs. The structure will likely have access via a garage door, a front entry personnel door and a separate door for accessing the grounds equipment/supplies.

This will be a significant addition to our property. Because of the likely location near the Lodge, the current thinking is to incorporate elements to the storage garage's exterior so it will be compatible with and look attractive near the Lodge. The type of construction, detailed layout and overall design remain to be determined. The Construction Committee has also tossed around ideas regarding other needed projects that may *possibly* be incorporated into this one such as expansion of the parking area and updating the deteriorating water line into the Lodge.

When we have a pretty good handle on the design, we will see if any of the work could be done by Obsidian volunteers. In the past Obsidians have been ready and willing to provide the sweat equity needed to keep the costs of projects like this in check. Perhaps we will have the opportunity to do it again.

Climb School

SPRING TIME IS THE RIGHT TIME TO START THINKING ABOUT MOUNTAINEERING, whether you are learning the basics or refreshing your skills. The Obsidians and Eugene Mountain Rescue will be instructing the fundamentals of rock and glacier travel in the classroom and field sessions of the 2013 Climb School. This entry level course is recommended for anyone interested in participating in a climb where ropes, crampons, or other technical gear will be used to navigate hazardous terrain.

In the first session, Climb School participants will learn basic rock climbing using a fixed line, rappelling, and other fundamentals in the classroom on April 4th. This knowledge will be put to practice at the Skinner Butte Columns, with the choice of the 6th or 7th. The second session will cover roped glacier travel, self-arrest, and other basics of mountaineering in the snow. The snow classroom session will take place April 18th with the follow up field session on the 20th, likely at Santiam Pass. The Obsidians and Eugene

Mountain Rescue members will be on hand to help you learn knots, give you tips for gear, share stories, and words of advice.

The Obsidians will be hosting graduation climbs for climb school participants to put some of the new skills into practice. The climb fees for the graduation climbs are not included in the climb school cost and the locations will be determined as the Obsidian climb schedule is developed.

The cost of the class is \$50 for Obsidian members or members of Eugene Mountain Rescue, and \$75 for non-members.

Climb School is available for persons in good physical condition and at least 16 years old (or at least 13 years of age if accompanied by an adult).

Other News from the Climbs Committee

IN ADDITION TO SCHEDULING CLIMBS, this year the Climbs Committee is adding conditioning hikes to the schedule this spring. Conditioning hikes are designed to help you get into shape for the climbing season. Load up a pack with the gear you would normally take on a climb, put on those climbing boots, and head uphill on one of these conditioners and see whether your climbing muscles still work after months of less strenuous activity! What better way to get ready for the climbing season than joining us for a series of local trail classics. Get valuable feedback on clothing and gear while hiking trails you may never have seen before.

Each spring we offer a course in Basic Mountaineering

to enable people to get the skills needed to participate safely on climbs in alpine environments. Signup for Basic Climb School is currently under way. In addition to Basic Mountaineering, the Climbs Committee is developing a plan and schedule to offer an Intermediate Climb School. While Basic Mountaineering teaches the basic fundamentals of safe alpine climbing, ICS will teach you more advanced skills on rock and ice such as trip planning, route finding, navigation, risk management, anchors, and steep snow and ice.

The Climbs group has an email list available to Obsidian members. The purpose of this list is to give people an opportunity to communicate more easily with others in the Obsidians who identify themselves as climbers. Those who choose to add their emails to the distribution list will be able to send emails to climbers-list@obsidians.org. In order to keep the amount of spam to a minimum, only people whose email is on the list will be able to send emails to this address.

What will this do for us? This means that, for example, when we make a change to the Obsidian climbs schedule we can more easily inform other climbers of the change. For example, if weather and snow conditions look favorable and someone wants to add a climb to the schedule, the word can go out to others fairly easily.

You can sign yourself up to be included on this list. Log on to the members' area of the Obsidians website by clicking on the *Members* link in the blue bar at the left side of the page. Then click *EList Mgmt* to bring up the page that allows you to sign up for the climbers list.

Summer Camp 2013 Trinity Alps July 8-13, 2013 Cost: Members \$165

QUESTION: *What exactly is Summer Camp?*

ANSWER: It's a time to focus on nature, reconnect with old friends and make new ones. No wifi, TV and only 3-4 chores the entire period. All the food you can eat! We provide the ingredients and you prepare your own continental breakfasts and lunches; hot dinners will be catered. A typical day is continental breakfast at 6:45; go hiking with a group at 8:00; back in plenty of time for a shower and 'happy hour'; dinner at 6:30; sit around the campfire or read in your tent; and asleep by 10:00. For more details, ask an Obsidian who has been before; there's a least one on every hike or snow trip.

Q: *Where are the Trinity Alps and which campground will we use?*

A: The Trinity Alps are the snowcapped mountains northwest of Redding, California. This large wilderness area includes peaks ranging from 7,000-9,000 feet, deep glacial

canyons, and spectacular mountain meadows. The wildflowers should be at their peak. We'll be staying in Fawn Group Campground, 14 miles north of Weaverville on Highway 3. The campground has flush toilets and running water. It is on Trinity Lake—you can walk from the campground to go swimming or boating. The reservoir is huge and deep with several 'arms'—think Shasta or Lake Billy Chinook with houseboats and powerboats.

Q. *In past years, there has been limited space for RVs and tent trailers. Is that the case this year?*

A. There is plenty of space for RVs and tent trailers this year. Unlike most summer camps, this campground has 19 numbered sites, each with a picnic table and a parking space. Most of the sites will accommodate two tents, or a tent and an RV. The sites will not be assigned in advance. In addition, there are some open tent areas.

Q. *What's the cost?*

A. The cost per session for adult Obsidian tenters, RVers and children over age 12 is \$165 for 5 days of camping and food—what a bargain! That includes all fees and taxes and

three healthy, hearty meals per day. The cost for children ages 6-11 is \$85. Children under 6 are free. Non-Obsidians are \$195/100.

Q. *This sounds great! When can I sign up?*

A. Online sign-ups will begin on Sunday, March 17, the day after most Obsidians receive the paper copy of the *Bulletin*. In addition, you will have to complete a paper registration form and mail it along with full payment of \$165 (adults) within five days of signing up. The application will be available online and will also be included in the mailed March *Bulletin*. Additional details regarding the process will be in the March *Bulletin*.

Q. *I have to pay the full payment upon initial registration? Don't we usually pay a non-refundable deposit and then send in the balance later?*

A. Yes, that's been the practice in the past. But many folks forget and have to be reminded about paying the balance, plus it's a lot more work for the Camp Treasurer. So this year, we will pay the amount in full within five days of registering online. If you cancel prior to May 31, the same re-



fund policies we've had in the past will apply, i.e. adults will receive a refund of \$130.

Additional information and the registration form will be in the March *Bulletin*. The 'Camp Rally' is the April 26 potluck.



A Real Pain in the You-Know-What!

I WAS ASKED TO SHARE INFORMATION ABOUT STRETCHING THE PIRIFORMIS MUSCLE, a deep muscle in the buttock. When overly tight, the piriformis muscle can provoke sciatic pain or provoke pain across the lateral hip and thigh. Muscle imbalances can lead to pain and serious injury if not corrected in a timely manner. And it is common to develop muscle imbalances when a person over trains some muscles without cross training complementary muscles. Lack of stretching can also contribute to creating muscle imbalances. I am presenting two hip stretches that may be helpful in restoring balance and comfort to your hips and legs. Both of these stretches protect the spine and are performed while lying on your back.

Start with your knees bent and feet on the floor. The piriformis stretch involves placing the right ankle across

the left knee, then pulling that left knee towards your chest with your hands or a belt. You will feel the stretch across the right buttock, side of your hip and outside of the thigh. Hold 30 to 60 seconds and repeat as needed to release tension. Stretch each hip in this fashion.

The second stretch is for the hip external rotators and begins the same way - on your back with knees up and feet on the floor. Pull one knee towards your chest and to the opposite shoulder. Again feel the stretch across the buttock, side of your hip and outside of the thigh. Hold 30 to 60 seconds. Repeat with each leg.

The low back and hips are complex. This article is focusing on only a tiny portion of possible stretches and issues involving this area. If you are having pain that is not resolving in the low back, hip or leg, a thorough evaluation is recommended by a physical therapist or other appropriate healthcare practitioner.

Walking Tours of England

On the second trip in September 2011, accompanied by Kathy Hoeg, they hiked in the picturesque Cotswolds region dotted with historic villages such as Chipping Campden and Stow-on-the-Wold, then traveled down to the southwestern corner of England to hike the rugged coastline of Cornwall, home of the King Arthur legend (and the Doc Martin television series).
